HINSDALE.

Previous to that morning soft coal had been burned in the stove and when a wood fire was started, the soot added feul to the fire and in addition scorched the wood work. Beyond that no damage was done and no one regrets the fire except the village, whom it cost about six dollars.

At no time since the Hinsdale library association turned over its collection of books to the village and thus placed s foundation of a good public library, has that institution been in a more flourishing condition. The library report states the total number of books issued during November was 837. Of these 438 were fiction, 305 juvenile, 32 literature, 18 poetry, 15 history, 10 biography, nine science, eight travels and two miscellaneous. During the four hours the library was open last Satur-

day alone, there were issued 130 books. Over 2,130 volumes comprise the library, including a recent purchase of late publications. The growth of the library has been steady and the constantly increasing number of volumes has required the purchase of new book cases. Another will soon be added .-




