WATER MAIN ANNEXATION.

At various times during the past two years the plan of annexing the eleven blocks on the north side, bounded by Midway avenue, Grant street, Highland avenue and Chicago avenue, has been considered by the board of trustees of the village and the property owners interested. The tract consists of 249 lots in E. H. France's subdivision, and has a population of approximately 75 people, who are now without the benefits of village improvements, such as street lighting, water and fire protection.

Two years ago the residents of that district applied for admission to the village, but were refused by the then board of trustees for various reasons. Mainly on the ground that the expense of opening streets, building crosswalks and making other improvements, would have been entirely out of proportion to the then very limited population of that tract, and the revenue derived therefrom.

Since that time, however, the population has materially increased, and the value of the property has greatly appreciated. The assessed valuation of the property as described, now being approximately \$15,000 or \$20,000. There is every reason to believe that the village board will now favorably consider a petition for annexation from the residents of that section.

The revenue derived by the village from the property in that district would be considerable, especially should the water mains be extended up the new streets. The only expense to the village being the outlay for street crossings and a limited amount for street improvements.

To the property owners of the district the annexation would be somewhat heavier, but the benefit derived would be more than correspondingly increased. Whereas now the village water mains are almost at their very doors, they are prevented from using the village water under the ordinance, on account of being without the corporate limits of the village. Under annexation the mains could be extended at a nominal cost, to Grant street, furnishing water both for domestic use and protection against fire, thereby increasing the value of their property. In addition to this they would have the benefits of sidewalks and crossings, street lamps and police protection, all of which they do not now enjoy. By annexation of this tract both the village and the property owners would be mutually benefited, and it is a matter that should receive careful consideration by those interested.

HOLDING TOWNSHIP CAUCUSES.

Heretofore it has been the custom in nominating township officers, to assemble in a non-partisan caucus and there select business for the various offices, irrespective of party affiliations, and there being but one nomination for an office, was equivalent to an election. This manner was approved by the township republican organization in the interest of harmony between the parties. Several times it has happened—and the past year is no exception—that township officers, elected through the suffrages of republicans, have worked dead against the party who placed them in office, in county, state and national campaigns, as was the case in the one recently closed. This has caused much dissatisfaction among the republicans in Downers Grove township. They are now seriously considering, in fact have almost fully decided, to retain partisan organization in making township nominations, and hereafter call no non-partisan caucuses to nominate town officers.

LET US HAVE STREET SIGNS.

President Carpenter made a wise suggestion at the last meeting of the village board, which was to take steps toward having signs, having street names thereon, at corners of intersecting streets. Trustee Schultz moved that the street and alley committee be instructed to purchase signs and have them placed in position, but the motion received no second and was lost in the consideration of other business. The idea is an excellent one, and the amount necessary to be expended to secure this improvement is ridiculously small, compared with the convenience it would be to citizens and the stranger within our gates. The matter should not be allowed to drop, without some favorable action being taken by the board.

At the next meeting, improvements in the village have not been so excessive of late as this small item of expense need be considered an extravagance.

Mr. Hopkins of Illinois fixes the date of the convention of the special session not later than March 20. He is a member of the ways and means committee, and understanding that the republican members of that committee will go to work upon a tariff bill with a view to the presentation of it to the house upon the special session next. He believes it can be put through congress in time to satisfy President McKinley's signature. Responsibility will be made in the name of the new tariff. It will be the line of the reciprocity committee. The republican subcommittee of the ways and means committee reported that McKinley has expressed

opportunity in the new tariff. The call for the special session will state that it is for the consideration of the tariff, and will specify no other purpose. The form of the call will not necessarily limit congress to tariff legislation, but it will convey to the body that such is the president's earnest desire, and will probably be respected. In order to hasten action on the tariff it is understood that as few appointments to office as possible will be made until the bill is out of the way. Mr. McKinley is firmly of the opinion that the bill can become a law in June.

A dispatch to Chicago papers from Rockford is as follows: It is probable that a bill will be presented in the next general assembly for the creation of a new Fourteenth Judicial District to include the counties of Bureau, DeKalb, Whiteside and Lee, two counties being taken from the Thirteenth Judicial District and one from the Ninth and Twelfth districts. The Ninth district is now made up of Grundy, Bureau, Will and LaSalle counties, and it is claimed that its judges are unable to keep up with the business, and the dockets in Will and LaSalle are in consequence in a deplorable condition. The reduction of the work of the judges would greatly facilitate business, which is also crowded, in this district. Petitions for the change are now in circulation. The formation of a new district would take Judge Crabtree of Dixon from this circuit and necessitate the election of a new judge at the regular election next spring. If DeKalb was taken out of this district it would fix things nicely for Donnelly and Brown.

It now seems certain that Maceo, the Cuban insurgent leader, has been killed. His death was effected through treachery on the part of the Spaniards and one of his trusted followers. The dastardly act was committed no doubt with an idea that it would weaken the Cubans to a great extent, but this will not be the case, however, for the insurgents are aroused now as never before and will increase their activity to avenge the death of their beloved leader. There are many capable officers among the Cubans who are competent to assume the position of the dead Maceo and carry on the campaign planned by him. Cuba is bound to be free from the galling yoke of Spanish despotism and that at no distant day.

That profound itinerant statesman W. J. Bryan declined to express an opinion on the merits or demerits of the President's Message until after he has read that document. This conclusion confirms us in the belief that the recent "campaign of education" resulted in an educational benefit to the nominee of the Chicago Convention.

It would seem that nothing of interest could transpire in this county without the newspapers being aware of the event. There are now eleven weekly newspapers published in DuPage county, three of which were established during the past year. This number is exclusive of several college publications at Wheaton and Naperville.

No doubt Mr. Prince will make a strenuous "kick" against the proposed annexation of eleven blocks in his north side addition. This would not be strange considering his recent antipathy to paying for any extension of water works.

SUPERVISORS' PROCEEDINGS.

Proceedings of the board of supervisors of DuPage county at a special meeting held at the court house in the city of Wheaton, Dec. 7, 1895.

All members of the board were present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Moved by Supervisor Hamerschmidt that \$200 be allowed to the county clerk for the Elgin asylum for Christmas presents. Carried.

Moved by Supervisor Betts that the states attorney be limited to file objections to the city of Wheaton Special Assessment No. 16. Carried.

Moved by Supervisor Hamerschmidt that board adjourn to visit the poor farm. Carried.

Moved by Supervisor Blodgett that the following resolution be adopted. Carried.

Whereas, the county farm committee have recommended that there be set apart for cemetery purposes the following parcel of ground, to-wit: A strip of land extending five rods east and west and three rods north and south out of the northwest corner of the campus upon which the county farm buildings are located, and

Whereas it appears that a plot of ground is necessary to be appropriated for the use named and that the parcel above named is suitable for cemetery purposes, therefore, be it Resolved, by the board of supervisors of the county of DuPage, that the same be heretofore described be and the same be hereby designated as a cemetery for cemetery purposes, and that the same be exclusively used for the burial of such deceased persons whose burial expenses shall be borne by the county of DuPage or any of the several towns therein.

Be it further resolved that said cemetery shall be under the immediate control of the superintendent of the county farm and he shall admit persons to burial only upon the certificate of the coroner of the county or the supervisor of the proper town, except that in the event that the superintendent shall be absent from the county, then the town clerk of the proper town may issue such certificate.

Be it further resolved, that no body shall be removed from the cemetery except upon the written permit of the supervisor of the town from which said pauper or unknown person was removed.

Moved by Supervisor Hamerschmidt that Board of J. W. McKos as county collector for the year 1896 be approved. Carried.

Moved by Supervisor Hamerschmidt that the following report of the committee on claims be allowed.
