Samuel H. Yahres, a Popular Young Man, Succumbs After a Short Illiness.

With deepest regret and the most profound sympathy for bereaved companions and friends, it becomes our solemn duty to record the sudden death of Samuel H. Yahres, which occurred at the home of his ffiend and business partner, J. Worth Carnahan, about 5 o'clock p. m. Monday.

Until recently Mr. Yahres had made his home with Mr. Carnahan, but in order that he might enjoy the society of his brother, John M. Yahres, a student of the Chicago College of Dentistry, he had decided to make the city nis headquarters for the winter. His Chicago address was 881 West Harrison street, where about two weeks ago he contracted a severe cold which settled in his throat and resulted in the tem porary 'oss of his voice. Last Sunday, a week ago, Mr. Carnahan brought he and his brother to his home here, where he seemed to improve rapidly and his voice returned, under the treatment prescribed by Dr. Almes of Chicago. On Wednesday he was taken with chills and fever and Dr. Gourley was called in. A trained nurse was engaged to administer to his wants and everything done which kind and loving hands could do to make him comfortable. Again he rallied, much to the surprise of both Drs. Almes and Gourley, who were expecting a run of typhoid fever. Monday morning he was unusually strong and cheerful and insisted on writing some letters. At noon his temperature, pulse and respiration were normal. At 4 o'clock he complained of a severe pain in his left groin. The pain gradually grew worse despite the efforts of a professional nurse to relieve the same. Dr. Gourley was hastily summoned but he was out of town. As an emergency Dr Roberts was called, but nothing could be done to relieve the sufferer other than what had already been done by the rurse. Powerful restoratives had no effect.
