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HINSDALE.
Supervisor McClintock will be one of the committee to go to Ottawa next Tuesday, to attend a three day's convention of the supervisors and county clerks of the state. The rest of the committee are Messrs. Bender, Fischer, and Lawrence. Mr. McClintock is chairman of the committee and will probably take a prominent part in the proceedings of the state association.

Prof. J. E. McGilorey, the assistant professor of Pedagogy and high school visitor of the University of Illinois, inspected the high school, Thursday with a view of placing it on the accredited list. Mr. McGilorey has visited the majority of the schools in the state, and he stated that Hinsdale could more than be proud of its Central school building. It is without doubt one of the best arranged and attractive buildings in the state.

Conflicting opinions were rendered when the new fifteen horse power engine was placed in the south side school building, as to the capability of the engine to run the heating fans properly. The recent cold snap tested the efficiency of the plant and now the big building, with its thousands of cubic feet of air to be heated, is perfectly ventilated and properly and evenly heated. When the thermometer was 25 degrees below zero—the coldest weather in twenty-five years—Janitor Bromley found no trouble in heating each room up to seventy. This speaks well for the new engine and its engineer.

Township Collector Prentiss has entered into the work of gathering in the taxes with good spirit and during the past week collected nearly \$2000. During the two days he was in Hinsdale his office was swarmed with people, who, strange as it may seem were anxious to pay their taxes. There will be over \$74,000 collected from the township this year and of this over \$30,000 will go for school purposes. The amount certified to for this school district is \$20,000, but it is not probable that more than \$17,000 will be secured. The tax for Hinsdale's school district alone equals that of all the other districts in the township. Building the Central school house is the cause for the extraordinarily high school tax, and a statement of the cost of the structure will be given in our next issue. When the detailed account is given, there will be no cause for complaint, as the building was erected for a very low price considering the size and beauty of the structure. With the exception of the school and county taxes, the taxes are lower than last year.—Dolans.
