Political, Roligious, Social and Orimina Doings of the Whole World Carefully Condensed for Our Readers The Accident Record.

The Silver Springs bleachery at Providence, R. I., has been running on full time. For eight months the plant has been running eight hours a day. About 500 hands are employed.

The Greene & Daniels yarn mills at Central Falls, R. I., has begun on a sixty-hour week schedule, after being on a forty-hour schedule since last summer. The company employs over a thousand persons.

The mills of the Farwell Worsted company at Providence, R. I., employing 500 hands, have resumed operations after a long period of curtailment.

The Kent Woolen company of Centerville, R. I., and a number of smaller plants are making preparations to start their machinery.

The repair shops of the consolidated road at Valley Falls, R. I., have started up on full time of sixty hours a week. About 500 hands are employed.

The Candee company, manufactur ers of rubber footwear at New Haven, Conn., has resumed operations after an idleness of about two months. By Wednesday the full complement of 1,200 hands will probably be at work.

The Riverside steel works at Benwood, W. Va., have resumed work. Fifteen to eighteen hundred hands went to work after an extended idleness. Many repairs have been made in all departments.

The Hon. Wayne MacVeagh, the United States ambassador to Italy, and Mrs. MacVeagh left Rome Monday on their way home.

The Japanese government has decided to adopt the gold standard at the rate of 32 1-3 to 1. The smallest gold piece will be of the value of five yen. The silver yen will gradually be withdrawn. The new project comes into operation in October.

The jury in the case against Newton Lane, charged with the murder of Colonel Henry C. Rodenbaugh, proprietor of the Hotel Woodford, Versaitles, Ky., and his son James, in August, 1895, returned a verdict of acquittal this afternoon.

The United States grand jury at Louisville, Ky., returned indictments against ex-President J. M. McKnight of the German National bank and Alderman Britt, charging them with conapiracy to misappropriate and misappropriation of the funds of a national bank.

The present population of Canada is estimated by the department of agriculture at 5,125,436.

At the beginning of business Monday the gold reserve of the United States treasury amounted to \$148,582,-565, representing a gain of \$264,000 on Saturday. President McKinley will go into office with the gold reserve larger than at any previous time since the administration of President Harrison.
