Wild geese have been speeding northward unusually early and in great flocks. They are at least a week or ten days ahead of the season in their great northern flight, so that the weather sages are smilingly positive that spring is already in the land. At different times on Sunday three flocks swept over this village, marked like a chain of winged dots against the cloudless heaven, and they were not so far aloft but that their shrill cries were heard distinctly in all parts of the town.

The Australian ballot law imposes many duties upon the village clerk. The law requires that three times as many ballots be printed as were cast at the last previous election; that the judges be provided with twice the number of ballots cast and that the other third be kept on hand as a safeguard against accident. The ballots must be issued to the judges in sealed packages of 100 each and must be carefully counted and prepared. The voting places for the town election and the judges are the same as at presidential election.

Mrs. Mary Griffith, foster-mother of Mrs. R. S. Chandler, of West Chicago, was found dead in her room, at the home of Mr. Chandler, last Monday morning. She had attended church on Sunday and retired in the evening in apparent good health. She was 83 years of age, and the cause of death given by the coroner's jury was heart disease.

They say that Lombard is getting to be a sporty town. They had cock fights until all their birds were slaughtered by visiting crows, and they went one round up the ladder and had a regular Corbett-Fitzsimons slugging match. The mill came off a week or so ago, and the big bets were all made on the heavy weight, the money staying in Lombard. No press representative was allowed in the North-side hall, but the next grand jury will take a hand in sitting the chair from the wheat.

The grand jury was given a statement of the cost, amount of warrants issued, and the business generally relating to the erection of a new court house. Although many members of the jury had been objectors to the building of a new court house, yet they could find no fault with the doings of the building committee, and recognized value received for every dollar expended. The warrants are now all issued and amount to \$11,500. They are all held by parties in DuPage county. The balance of contract price will be paid in money from taxes collected.

HINSDALE.

The commissioners of Highways of the town of Downers Grove, made the following report for the year ending on the 31st day of March, 1897, to wit: Road and bridge money received, \$1,548.25; road and bridge money expended, \$6,198.91. Balance on hand, \$4,339.37.

During the evening a number of able and eloquently delivered addresses were made by several of the distinguished guests, which were responded to by the officers of Junonia lodge.

The following is a statement of James McClintock, supervisor of the town of Downers Grove, of the amount of public funds received and expended by him during the fiscal year just closed, ending on the 30th day of March, 1897, showing the following items: Amount of public funds on hand at the commencement of the fiscal year, commencing the first day of April, 1896, \$856.69; received from Jas. W. McKeen, county treasurer, 1896 tax, \$801.61; Frank J. Prentiss, collector, 1896 tax, \$1829.14. Total receipts, \$3287.44. Total expenditures, \$2122.21. Balance on hand March 30th, 1897, \$1165.23.

Dr. Morrow together with his patients and assistant underwent quite a scare from a small blaze which occurred in his office in the Schickorra building, Monday morning. The doctor uses a small gas machine in his laboratory for melting and heating materials used in his work and it was from this that one of the draperies caught fire and heated the storage tank of the generator nearly to the point of explosion. In the adjoining room was another machine holding one hundred and fifty gallons of very explosive gas under a pressure of fifteen hundred pounds to the inch. Had the flames reached this the entire front of the building would have been wrecked and the explosion would have been attended by some loss of life, as quite a number of people were in the street below. As it was the fire was speedily extinguished and the damage was confined to the wood-work and furnishings.
