HINSDALE.

J. M. Barr completed the work of assessing the property of Hinsdale this week, but will not have his books ready to be sent to the county clerk until early in July.
The Hinsdale second team administered a smarting defeat to the Downers Grove baseball team last Saturday morning, on the grounds of the latter. The score was 21 to 13.
Officer Nicholson found his services required on Monday afternoon in subduing a drunken resident of the downtown district. Upon the promise of the man's family to control him and keep him off the streets the officer decided to make no arrest.
The commissioners' report and estimate of the cost of improving streets was presented at the adjourned meeting of the village council Wednesday evening and was as follows: Second street, two blocks, \$4,200; Hickory, Elm and Pine, \$17,000; Oak, from Walnut to Chicago avenue, \$4,466; Hinsdale avenue, \$4,900; Fourth street, Woodside avenue and Oak, \$18,900; and Fifth street, \$9,100. The total estimated cost of improvements already ordered will reach sixty thousand dollars. This is twenty-five thousand dollars less than last year.
Frederick Bagley, aged 11 years, was the victim of a bicycle accident Wednesday afternoon which was painful but not serious. While riding along Walnut street with several of his companions, his wheel struck a stone and threw him under a passing lumber wagon. With presence of mind he caught hold of the reach and saved himself from being crushed beneath the wheels. He was dragged several yards and badly bruised about the legs and head. He was carried into a neighboring house and a physician sent for.

WHEATON.

Judgment was obtained against the delinquent tax list, with few exceptions Monday, and the sale will go merrily on. The objectors will be heard in the county court in a few weeks.
The city fathers are getting in shape to build a city hall near the waterworks power house. The lower portion will be caged for a calaboose and the upper portion will be partitioned off for a council room and city offices.
The order making it compulsory to bring back one mild inmate for each violent one taken to the Elgin asylum, has placed John Rathgen and Dora Goltzman at the county farm. The former is from Addison and the latter from Roselle.
E. H. Gary, wife and daughter Bertha sailed from New York Wednesday on the City of Paris for England. They will arrive in time to attend the Queen's Jubilee. They left Wheaton Monday with the happy wish of all for a pleasant voyage and safe return. In about two months "welcome home" will greet them.
At the last meeting of the board of supervisors the clerk was instructed not to have the proceedings printed until they were approved. Hereafter the proceedings will be from one to two months old when published. Seems like a strange departure, and looks as if the supervisors did not approve of their own actions until approved.
When the section hands got about halfway to College Avenue station last Saturday morning, they found the body of a man who had either fell from or been struck by a train during the night. From all appearances he had been instantly killed, having received a cut in forehead and chin. There was nothing on his person which gave the slightest clue of who he was or where he was from, and after an inquest the body was interred at the county farm as "Unknown." He was a dark complexioned man, between 35 and 40 years of age, about 5 feet 6 inches in height, dark brown hair, sandy mustache, blue eyes, and weighed about 160 pounds. It would not be a bad idea for the board of supervisors to order the coroner to have unknown parties, as above, photographed for future identification by friends or relatives.—Illinoisian.
