VILLAGE BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

Downers Grove, June 7th, 1897.

The regular monthly meeting for the month of June, 1897, was called to order by President Bush. Roll call noted present Trustees Schultz, Hughes, Barr, Root and Mochel. Absent Mayer. The minutes of the last regular and special meetings were read and approved. The reports of village Treasurer, collector and superintendent of water works were read and ordered placed on file.

A communication was read from the Globe Light and Heat Co., in regard to the deduction made from their April bill on account of poor service. Communication was referred to Mr. Slusser to answer.

The bond of J. W. Rogers, treasurer; V. Simonson, collector; M. Slusser, attorney; J. D. Fowler, superintendent of water works; W. H. Mertz, street commissioner; Jas. Dixon, police constable and druggist's bonds of Bush & Simonson and W. S. Carpenter were then read and upon proper motion were approved by the board.

Claim ordinance No. 54 providing for the payment of certain claims was then read and was as follows:

It was moved and carried that claim ordinance be put upon its passage. Said claim ordinance No. 54 was then put upon its passage and carried by the following vote: Yeas, Schultz, Barr, Hughes, Root and Mochel. Total five; nays none.

Trustee Root then brought up the matter of placing the fountain now at the waterworks pumping station. It was moved and carried that the matter be referred to the improvement committee with power to act and instructed to place fountain, where in their judgment it would be of the most benefit to the general public.

The matter of Thos. Stevens' drain on the North side and others in same location was discussed at length. No action taken in matter. Mr. Stevens stated that he would abate the nuisance and the health officer was instructed to investigate and report all cases of violations of the ordinances regarding drains.

The matter of dog tax was brought up and Constable Dixon instructed to collect all dog tax from owners, or serve papers to bring action for collection of same before the police magistrate.

President Bush reported a lawn service pipe had been found that had nev-

er been reported to the collector by the plumber making connection, but that the person was willing to pay for all water used. After some discussion it was decided to have the collector and superintendent make an invoice of all taps and fixtures. Upon motion matter was referred to water committee with power to act. Also instructed to investigate the use of water over time.

The matter of delinquent water tax was presented and collector was instructed to notify delinquents they must pay or have water cut off.

A. F. Courtright requested the board to remit license fee for operating sprinkling wagon for 1897. Upon proper motion said license was remitted, all voting aye.

W. J. Herring being present request permission to allow buffers at the alley entrance to new Oldfield building to project six inches into Curtiss street, which was granted, but was denied permission to use open gratings in the sidewalks.

The street and alley committee was instructed to have sidewalk in front of Klein's market raised to a level with the walk in front of Chilvers' building.

The matter of having bicycle signs painted was brought up and referred to improvement committee with instructions to have four signs painted and placed at each end of Main street and Maple avenue.

President Bush then brought up matter of policeman's salary, recommending that the salary be \$50 per month and that the policeman be forbid receiving subscriptions from citizens. The following resolution was then presented and read:

Resolved, that the salary of the policeman for night service shall be fifty dollars per month for fiscal year ending May, 1898, in full of all compensation for such services, and he is hereby forbidden to receive compensation from private firms or individuals.

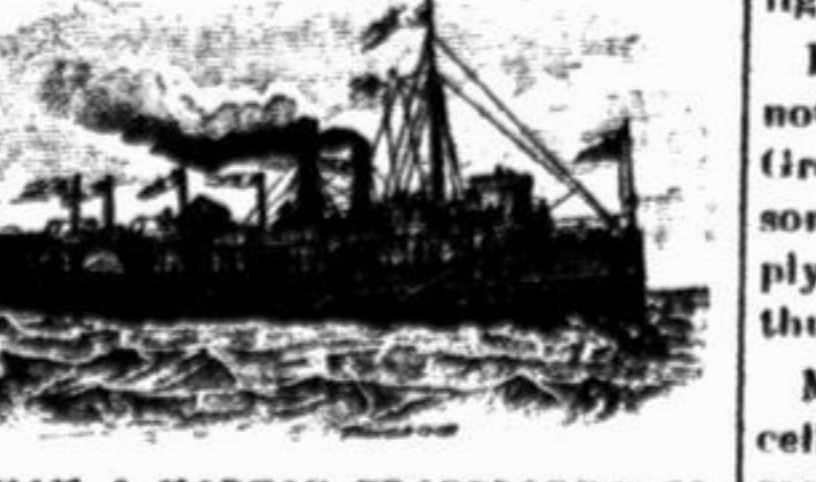
Said resolution was then put upon its passage and carried. Those voting aye were Trustees Schultz, Hughes, Barr, Mochel and Root. Total 5; nays none. President Bush then re-appointed P. J. Kearney as policeman. Upon proper motion the board confirmed the appointment.

The report of water committee on stand pipe was that they found foundation in bad condition. The committee was instructed to have foundation of stand pipe covered with a copper roof to prevent water getting at it, also to have stand pipe painted, color to be the same as at present.

The matter of walk in front of the pumping station was discussed. Still in hands of street and alley committee.

The matter of insurance on village property was then brought up. It was regularly moved and carried that insurance be written on the machinery in pumping station against explosion of boilers for \$7,500 for three years providing the premium be \$68 or less, otherwise for one year for \$33. The matter of placing this insurance together with all other insurance be referred to finance committee with power to act. Upon proper motion board adjourned. **BERT C. WHITE, Clerk.**
