Mrs. Sarah Ann Bateman, wife of William Bateman, one of the pioneer settlers of the township, died at her home on Maple avenue, Thursday, July 1st, 1897, at the advanced age of 79 years. She leaves to mourn her a husband and seven children, all of whom were able to attend her funeral, which occurred at the house Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Rev. Herbert H. Rood conducted the ceremonies, and her six grandsons bore her to rest in the west cemetery. She was well known to all the older residents of the village and will be sincerely mourned by many relatives and friends.

Sarah Ann Bateman was born April 28th, 1818, in Wisbeck, Cambridgeshire England. On February 18th, 1841, she was united in marriage to William Bateman, and together they came to America in the fall of 1852, and settled on the farm south of Downers Grove, where they resided until about ten years ago, when they came to the village, where they have since resided.

WEATHER AND CROP BULLETIN.

The temperature of the past week averaged from 4 to 10 degrees above normal, being highest in north-central counties, and rainfall from nothing in the extreme south to 2.50 inches in Montgomery county; good local showers prevailed generally over the state. Crops have continued to advance rapidly, corn especially making wonderful growth, and in the southern and central section is mostly laid by. Oats harvest has begun in the extreme south and the fields are showing signs of ripening over the entire state, the yield is fair but straw short; winter wheat and rye are being cut in the central section and stacked in the southern; clover cutting continues and timothy has begun, with fair yield; much clover has been damaged by the rains. Gardens and late potatoes are doing well; millet sowing continues, and buckwheat sowing has begun; small fruits are plentiful and fine, tree fruits very promising.

Northern section: The temperature of the week averaged from 8 to 10 degrees above normal, being highest in central counties, and rainfall averaged about normal. It was heaviest in McHenry county, and good in a strip running from Rock Island southeastward. The week was highly favorable for corn which has grown very rapidly, cultivation continues and early fields are being laid by. Oats continue short, and somewhat thin, are in full head and show signs of ripening in early fields; rye is being cut, with fair results; clover cutting continues and a few have cut timothy; pastures and meadows have improved under the heat and rain; gardens are good; raspberries plentiful.

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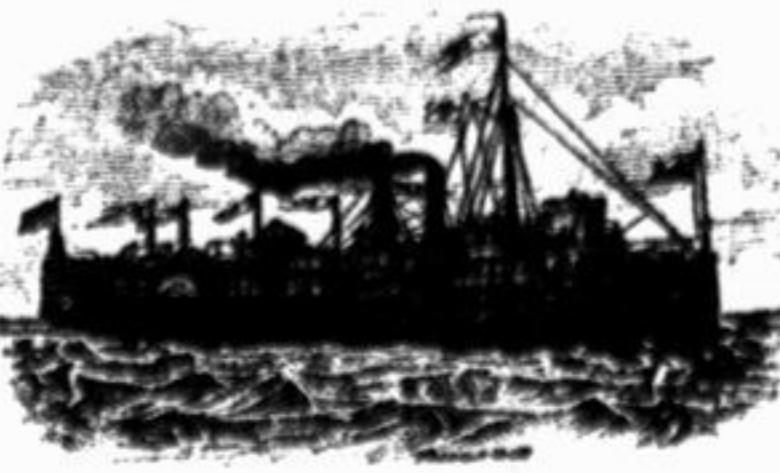
