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**A GREAT DAY FOR CHICAGO**

The pedestal for the Logan monument was finished on Monday. No prominent figure in the war for the union was in response or in action more picturesque or dramatic than that of General Logan. He rode the storms of battle a master spirit and he looked it. St. Gaudens never had a finer subject than General Logan, and it is said that the statue to be unveiled next week is one of the very finest works that have come from his hands. It certainly ought to be. General Logan deserved the best in the way of tribute that the people can give, and the best any artist can give. The sculptor having done his part the people must do theirs.

Arrangements for the procession and for the ceremonies of unveiling are now complete. The veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic will be given the post of honor, the right of the column, and will be escorted by the national guard. General Logan took pride in the fact that he was a volunteer soldier, and his military education was received in the practical school of experience on the field. It is most appropriate that their should be a large attendance of the old volunteer soldiers or the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, particularly those who were members of Logan's old command. The 22nd of July will be a great day for the volunteer soldiers of the Union army, a great day for Chicago, and for Illinois. Arrangements are being made by the Downers Grove Post G. A. R. to attend in a body.

**WHAT THE TARIFF BILL DOES.**

Following are some of the benefits which the tariff bill, as it passed the senate, gives the people of this country:  
 It provides for reciprocity with all nations that make concessions to the United States.  
 It admits Hawaiian sugar free, but taxes sugars from other countries.  
 It reduces the tax on white pine from \$7 to \$1 per thousand.  
 It takes wool and hides from the free list.  
 It stops smuggling by greased travelers.  
 It discourages poker by an internal tax of 20 cents a pack on playing cards.  
 It taxes Bibles, but admits sacramental wafers free.  
 It contains no new anti-trust measures, but re-enacts the anti-trust clause of the act now in force.  
 It takes cotton from the free list and gives the cotton planters of the south free bagging and free ties and the western farmers free grain bags.  
 It does not tax tea and does not increase the tax on beer.  
 It raises the tax on coal for the benefit of the miners of the United States.  
 It increases duties generally so as to compensate for the difference between here and abroad.

The provision in the tariff bill for a stamp tax upon stocks and bonds and upon speculations in stocks and bonds is generally commended. This amendment, which has been adopted and made a part of the bill, places a stamp tax upon all bonds and stocks aside from those of building associations and other organizations of this character, and also places a tax upon each transaction in those bonds. This will compel the stock speculators of the great cities to contribute from 12 to 15 million dollars a year to the support of the Government and will thus insure that the new bill will meet running expenses of the government after the enormous supply foreign goods now in hand shall have been absorbed.

In America it is the custom—very nearly the usual custom—for parents to spend on the luxuries and pleasures of the family life the whole income. The children are educated according to this standard of expenditure, and are accustomed to all its privileges. No thought is taken of the time when they must set up households for themselves—almost invariably upon a very different scale from the one to which they have been used. To the American parent this seems only a natural downfall. They remark cheerfully they themselves began in a small way, and it will do the young people no harm to acquire a similar experience—forgetting that in most cases their children have been educated to a much higher standard of one than that of their own early life. They have used all they could accumulate during their life time—let their children do the same. The results of the system are crystallized in the American saying "There are but three generations from shirt sleeves to shirt sleeves." The man who acquires wealth spends what he makes. His child-

ren brought up in luxury, struggle unsuccessfully against conditions which they are unused, and the grandchildren begin in their shirt sleeves to toil for the wealth dissipated by the two preceding generations.—"Are American Parents Selfish," by Elizabeth Bissland in North American Review for July.

**WEATHER AND CROP BULLETIN.**

The past week was one of excessive heat the temperature averaging from 8 to 10 degrees daily above normal, and touching 100 nearly every day. Showers were very uneven and scattered the average being less than normal although central counties exceeded the normal. Many hoes and few men were overcome in the fields and work was a great hazard. Corn continues its rapid growth and early fields are now tasseling; oats have ripened up rapidly and cutting is well under way in the south half, with a fair yield and short straw; winter wheat and rye are generally in the shock in central counties and rye and barley are being cut in the north, the wheat giving good yield and fine berry; spring wheat is a failure; timothy haying is in progress and the yield is fair to good; fruit continues plentiful.

**NORTHERN SECTION.**

The temperature of the week averaged from 8 to 10 degrees daily above normal and rainfall somewhat less than normal, the showers being very uneven and scattered. Good showers fell at the end of the previous week and rain is not yet needed. The heat was very oppressive and many hoes and few men were killed in the fields. Corn has continued to grow rapidly and early fields are showing tassels; oats are ripening fast, cutting will begin this week; rye is generally cut and barley being harvested, also timothy, the latter proving good in many meadows; small fruits are plentiful.

**APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE.**

AN ORDINANCE making appropriations for corporate purposes, for the fiscal year from May 1, 1897, to April 30, 1898. Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the village of Downers Grove, in the county of Du Page and State of Illinois:

Section 1. That the following sums, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, be, and the same are hereby appropriated for corporate purposes of the village of Downers Grove, for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1897, and ending April 30, 1898:

Salaries of policeman and other officers.....	\$1000.00
For cleaning, repairing and improving streets and alleys.....	1300.00
For payment of cost of street lighting.....	1500.00
For payment of interest on general bonds of village.....	575.00
For payment of miscellaneous claims against village.....	1400.00
<b>Total.....</b>	<b>5775.00</b>

Section 2. The expenditures for corporate purposes shall be limited to the amount of the appropriations above authorized, unless further appropriations shall be made, as provided by law.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.
