WHEATON HAPPENINGS.
 J. W. Rogers, of Downers Grove, was appointed Tuesday, appraiser of the estate of James L. Nichols to make an appraisement of the estate for the purpose of ascertaining the amount due the State of Illinois growing out of the inheritance tax law.

The Coroners jury in the West Chicago collision case blamed no one and exonerated no one. It was one of those accidents in which no one in particular is to blame. Seven witnesses testified and the deposition of Engineer Courtney was taken. The jury sifted the evidence and could not place the blame, so a verdict was rendered accordingly.

On Saturday, July 31, the residents of Du Page county will assemble on their own property in Wheaton, the court house grounds, and spend the day in basket picnic style. Between lunches they will listen to speakers and bands of music. It will be the day for dedicating the new court house and as the present structure will be there long after this generation has departed, you should not miss this opportunity of a life time. The heavy fishermen leave for Powers Lake to-morrow. Sea captain L. C. Brown has been patenting devices the past six months which he will warrant to catch the largest fish at the proper time. Emil is going along to show Brown how they catch fish in Holland, and Stark will engineer the landing net. Hon. C. D. Bartlett will be on hand when the landing occurs and his testimony as to weights will be final. The constitution and bylaws provide that no fish shall be purchased.

 On Wednesday evening Willis Blackman entertained a few of his friends with a hay ride to Downers Grove. Misses Lucy Crady, Anna Cable, Lulu and Nellie Landis, Erna Linsley, Marie Zimmerman, Bonnie Blackman, Messrs. Earl Dean and Willis Linsley made up the party.

Officers Nicholson and Schneider had a pass at arms with a Pole residing at West Hinsdale at midnight Wednesday, near the county line road. The Pole was returning from work at Western Springs when he was stopped by the officers to learn about some pistol shots heard by them some time previous. Being over-stupid he thought they were attempting a hold-up, and grasping his whip, dealt Nicholson a heavy blow with the butt. A lively time ensued.

Accidents are a necessary attribute to the observance of the fourth of July and this year was blessed with more than its usual allowance. Six serious accidents is the painful record. At nine o'clock Thursday evening, a valuable horse and rig was stolen from the residence of Bert Walker at Oak Park and Officer Nicholson being notified of the robbery sallied forth to apprehend the thief. This he did shortly after half past eleven, at the county line road. He arrested the man who proved to be F. L. Dame alias Frank Jackson of La Grange who makes his living by selling Cathill's teas. Dame put up a strong game of bluff, which weakened into a confession under a severe cross examination. The rig and horse tallied exactly with the telephoned description. Nicholson immediately telephoned to Oak Park that he had caught the man, and the owner with the chief of police came for the rig and prisoner at three o'clock yesterday morning. This adds another to Mr. Nicholson's lists of exploits.
