THE COUNTRY NEWSPAPER. Few people realize the importance of what is called the country newspaper Although the newspaper published in a village or a town may occupy an office 8x10 in some garret it is the most important furtor in town. When you visit a community for the purpose of procuring business, if you read the local newspaper carefully you can form a better idea as to the character of the people with whom you propose to do business, than from any other source. Perusing its columns you can discover who are the progressing merchants, what local events are receiving the attention of the people, it enables you when you meet a man to engage in conversation on subjects, or enterprises that are engaging the attention of a particular commonity. Besides you learn the social movements, in other words, you should become interested and identified with those people so that you can talk with them on a subject of local interest and tell them of something of that which they already know People love to talk on a subject of which they are familiar and which they have some particular interest. I have never visited a community with a view of doing business without reading very carefully the advertisements in the local papers, the imformation that I gathered from such a perusal was always valuable to me in prosecuting my work.

THE LOGAN DAY DEMONSTRATION.

If any Downers Grove resident, remem bering the great events of World's Fair times, has been disposed to regard the Logan celebration with languid interest as something of interior size and importance, he should disabuse his mind of the notion at once.

Even the spectator of the great World's Fair parades will find the procession which is to march today interesting as one of the finest military and civic displays of recent years. The preparations for the day have gone forward with comparatively little flurry and display. There has been nothing like the excitement and the boisterous advortising with which New York colebrated the dedication of the Grant monument a short time ago. Logan's name to be recalled and bonored throughout the nation. A curious sign of the awakening interest is to be found in the large amount of biographical matter and the many war reminiscences now being published everywhere. The celebration has evidently stirred people to keener appreciation of the man and his services, and this stimulated interest, again, is making for a great popular demonstration today.

The indications are that in proportions and showiness of the parade, the dignit of the exercises at the unveiling of the monument and the display of the thousnade of people who will line the streets and blockade the entrances to the lake front the celebration will recall the marnificent displays which marked the festival events of four years ago.
