# A LETTER FROM ALASKA.

We publish this week extracts from a letter written by Frank Stickney, to his sister, Mrs. Emma Smith, who resides here, dated March 25th, 1897, from Circle City, Alaska, in the Klondyke region, the wonderful gold country. He says, "the past winter has been very severe, the thermometer registering as low as 70 degrees below zero. No house on the road and a snow bank for a bed.

Provisions are very scarce and high; there is no standard price for anything and it costs a great deal to live. The only mode of transportation is with dog teams. I paid eight hundred dollars for nine dogs last fall, and sold one for two hundred and twenty-five doliars. Could have sold them all at the same price and even higher. In regard to the gold taken out, the

contained four hundred dollars, another-some three hundred, some two hundred, and one hundred, a great many every day from thirty-five to fifty dollars a pan. One man panned six buckets of dust, and got two thousand dollars and another seven thousand.
