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FARMERS FOR POSTAL BANKS.

Newspapers have printed many expressions for workmen in favor of postal savings banks and resolutions of labor organizations calling for their establishment in the immediate future.

Wherever farmers have the opportunity of recording themselves on the proposition to establish postal savings banks they favor it.

The national congress at St. Paul also by resolution favored another reform of great importance to farmers in asking for the inauguration of a system of rural free-mail delivery.

STATUTE ON CHILD LABOR.

No child under the age of fourteen years shall be employed, permitted or suffered to work for wages at any gainful occupation such as in a mercantile institution, store, office, laundry, manufacturing establishment, factory or workshop within this state.

Further provision is made for the keeping of a register in which shall be recorded the names, ages and residences of all minors employed in any of the aforesaid places of labor within this state.

LABOR DAY.

Labor day was first officially celebrated in New York in 1882. Since then the custom of making the first Monday in September a holiday to be specially observed by wage earners has spread through most of the states in the Union.
