JUDGE BATTEN IS A MEMBER.

Judge John H. Batten is afflicted with hay fever and is now spending a month at his cottage in Petoskey, Mich. He was recently elected president of the only society formed of sufferers of a disease who have banded themselves into an association for mutual help and conference. It was organized in 1879 at Petoskey, under the name of the Western Hay Fever association, and it has recently elected officers for another year. Fourteen states were represented and the total membership is said to be over 900. In one day recently fourteen excursion trains arrived in Petoskey bearing patients from many states. A common ailment brings these people into close fellowship and has led to the establishment of the association. Why Petoskey is so favored a resort and why the sufferers here find relief rather than in other points near by is not explained. But it is a fact that sufferers go there from all over the country and that they have immunity from the trouble so long as they stay in the Michigan town. Hence it has become known as the "hay fever sufferers' paradise." It is thought by some that high altitudes prevent the disease, but that this is an error is shown by the fact that people from Colorado are frequently found at Petoskey getting the relief which their own altitudes do not afford. The Michigan town holds all the hay fever patients until the heavy frosts of fall have made it impossible for the pollen to afflict them.

HANDSOME MONUMENTAL WORK.

NEW DUPAGE COUNTY MAP.

The new DuPage county map is now completed and ready for delivery. It shows everything usually found on a county map, besides a large amount of other useful information.

It has been critically examined by a great many people of each township who are competent to judge, and passed upon as being correct.

It has the indorsement of all the county officers, and the board of supervisors have practically endorsed it, by ordering five copies in the new court house.

The map shows all farms with the number of acres and names of owners, together with all section lines and numbers, wagon roads, railroads, streams, cities, villages, post-offices, cross roads, settlements, school district boundaries, and numbers, school houses, and part of the drainage canals of the Chicago Sanitary District that passes through DuPage county. The diversions of the channel of the Desplaines river that cost millions, are also shown.

The size of the map is 46x54 inches, beautifully colored by school districts, and with a distinct band of colors around the boundaries of all the corporations.

For use in the school rooms of the county the map is especially useful as it shows the localities in which the pupils are personally interested, and consequently references to it would attract their attention and retain it. Pupils can readily see from the map how a township is numbered, how school districts, cities and villages are bounded and what they are, which would all lead to the inquiry of why are these divisions made. This would naturally lead the teacher to explain the government of school districts, townships and counties, all of which are in the hands of people in whom the children are interested. And thus the pupils would be instructed in the rudiments of geography and government without feeling the effort usually required in the study of subjects in which they have no personal interest.

The map has been presented for inspection to only fourteen school boards, and without a single exception, they have each ordered a copy for their school.
