Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Downers Grove, in the County of Dupage and State of Illinois:

Section 1. That the following portion of the Village of Downers Grove shall be known as the Fire Limits of said Village, to-wit.: All lots bounding and abutting upon the east side of Main street in said Village, between the C. B. & Q. Ry. right of way on the north, and south end of Lot 10, Curtiss addition, on the south, and all lots bounding and abutting upon the west side of said Main street lying between said C. B. & Q. Sec. 11. Whenever in the opinion of the President of the village any wall or other part of a burned building is danger ous, or when any building shall be deemed upsafe for the purpose for which it is used, or that shall be in danger of being set on fire from any defect in its construction, the President shall notify the owner or his agent, in writing, specifying wherein such damage consists or wherein such building is unsafe or defective. If the owner neglects or refuses, for the space of five days after the serving of such notice. to proceed to put such building in a safe condition or forthwith to pull down or secure such wall or dangerous parts of a burned building, he shall be subject to a penalty of not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, for each and every day such violation shall continue after five days from the serving of such notice. Sec. 12. Every builder, contractor, or

other person who shall construct any building in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance, and every architect or other person having charge of such a building who shall permit it to be so constructed, where no other penalty is provided, shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars, nor more than two hundred dollars; and every such person or persons shall be deemed to have been guilty of a separate offense for every day the same shall continue, and shall be subject to the penalty imposed by this section

for each and every separate offense. Sec. 13. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.

That it shall be unlawful for any person, unless authorized by the respective contractors for lighting the streets of said Village, or unless legally authorized by said Village, to at any time light or extinguish, or cause to be lighted or ex-

tinguished, any public lamp which any

contractor is or shall be required to light under his contract with the Village of Downers Grove, or any lamp required to be lighted under the control and authority of said Village, under a penalty of not less than Two Dollars nor more than Twenty Dollars for each and every offense. Sec. 2. That any person who shall break, injure, mutilate or obstruct any of the public or street lamps in the Village

of Downers Grove, shall be subject to a penalty of not less than Two Dollars nor more than Twenty Dollars for each and every offense. Sec. 3. This ordinance shall be in force
