**BAD ACCIDENT WHILE WHEELING.**

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Corson Badly Injured Last Sunday.

The breaking of a fork on a "Star" tandem, by William Corson and his wife, Mrs. Anna Corson, of Englewood, caused at least one of the couple very serious injuries. The accident occurred at 10:30 Sunday morning at the crossing on Main street in front of the Farmers & Merchants bank. Mr. and Mrs. Corson, together with Fred Foell and V. T. Edmunds were riding out from Chicago to spend the day with Capt. and Mrs. T. S. Rogers. The party came down the hill on Main street and were going at a 20-mile clip, the tandem in the lead, when they struck the crossing at the bank corner. Owing to the walk being slightly elevated from the street the shock snapped the fork square off. The riders were thrown fully twenty feet and both struck on their heads. Mrs. Corson struck on her chin and nose. Her jaw was broken at the chin, her nose was badly lacerated, both cheeks were torn from the corners of the mouth and several teeth were knocked out. Her husband struck on his forehead and was stunned and badly bruised. They were removed to Capt. Rogers' residence and Dr. W. A. Topp dressed their wounds and set the lady's jaw. Four stitches were required in the operation. Foell and Edmunds escaped unhurt. The former is employed in Capt. Rogers' market in the city. They returned to Chicago Sunday afternoon on the 3:08 p. m. train.
