THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

We also joined with the mayor of the city of Wheaton in an order to the Seth Thomas Clock Co., for a tower clock, the entire cost of which is to be \$873.00, one-half of which is to be paid by the citizens of Wheaton. We also advertised for a supply of coal for use of the county at the court house, and accepted the bid of Henry M. Plummer as per bills submitted to you at this meeting.

Moved by Supervisor Hammerschmidt that the chairman of finance committee with the sheriff, destroy vouchers that had been paid by County Treasurer by burning same. Carried.

Upon motion the matter of shortage in the account of M. B. Ellsworth as county clerk be filed as a claim against his estate Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Hammerschmidt that the states attorney be instructed to make settlement with A. H. Wiant on the payment by him of \$36.40 in addition to amounts already paid. Carried.

Upon motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt the following resolution was approved: Whereas claims for necessary extra clerk hire by several of the county officers have from time to time been allowed by this board, and

Whereas it appears that such extra clerk hire has for the most part been made necessary by the official correspondence of the several officers and the making of copies of various documents, and

Whereas in the opinion of this board it will be a matter of economy to the county and convenience to the officers and the public service for the county to employ a competent stenographer who thoroughly understands the use of the typewriter, and therefore,

Be it resolved that the committee on court house and grounds be, and the same is hereby authorized and directed to employ on trial for one month a competent stenographer at a salary of not exceeding \$10 per week, who shall perform such duties as above mentioned and such other necessary service for the county, as the public service may seem to require. Resolution adopted.

Moved by Supervisor Hull that the list of petit jurors as presented by the supervisors of the respective townships be accepted and approved. Carried.

Upon motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt the board adjourned until Monday, Sept. 30th, next.

REPORT OF COUNTY TREASURER.

To the Honorable Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage county, Ill.: I herewith submit my report of moneys received and paid out during the year ending September 30, 1897, as county treasurer and ex-officio county collector:

Meeting called to order by Chairman Bartlett. On roll call all members were present except Supervisors Blodgett and Murray. The reading of the proceedings of last meeting was dispensed with.

The following report of the finance committee was read and upon motion adopted: Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors:

Your committee to whom was referred the matter of examining the report and books of the county superintendent of schools, would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them. We have examined the report and books of the county superintendent of schools and find the same correct in all respects. All of which is respectfully submitted. GEO. A. FISCHER, Chairman.

The reports of K. T. Morgan, superintendent of schools were read before the full board and upon motion approved and adopted.

Moved by Supervisor Hull that county clerk be directed to extend the delinquent road tax in townships of Bloomingdale and Milton on the collector's books for 1897 for collection. Carried.

Moved by Supervisor McClintock that out of respect for the late Prof. J. K. Rassewiler, former county superintendent of schools of DuPage county, that the flag be raised over the court house at half mast. Carried.

Moved by Supervisor Bartlett that the county clerk be instructed to extend for collection on the collector's books for 1897 for Wayne township, a Canada thistle tax to the amount of \$10 against the property known as the Patrick Scott Dec. farm, being the southwest quarter of section 33, town 40, range 9 east. Carried.

Moved by Supervisor Hammerschmidt that county clerk be instructed to extend for collection on the collector's books for 1897 for York township, a Canada thistle tax to the amount of \$13 against the property of the Clark Land Syndicate of Florida, described as the west half of section 11, town 39, range 11, east. Carried.

Upon motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt the clerk was instructed to extend the taxes on the several collectors' books as follows, to-wit:

Upon motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt the county clerk was directed to extend a tax of 75 cents on each \$100 valuation of all property in DuPage county as equalized by the state board of Equalization for county purposes.

Moved by Supervisor Hull that John Auble be appointed Judge of election of Wayne township in place of Geo. W. Pickering who declines to serve. Carried.

On motion all bills on file were laid over until next meeting of board.

The committee on county farm made report and presented the following resignation: To the Chairman and Board of Supervisors of DuPage county, Ill.:

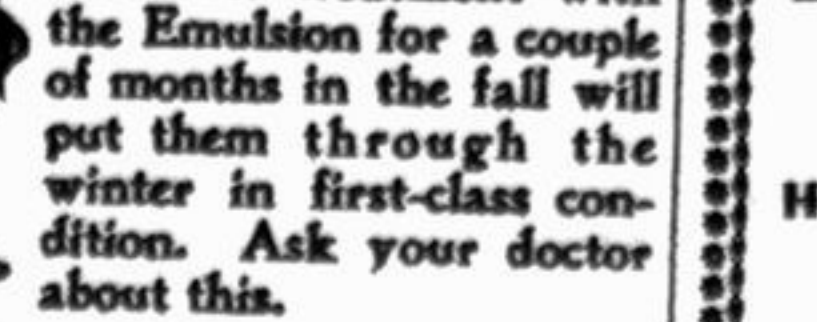
