SUPERVISORS' PROCEEDINGS.

Wheaton, Ill., Nov. 18, 1897.
Board of Supervisors of DuPage county
met at the court house pursuant to call,
Supervisor Bartlett in the chair.

On roll call all members answered to
their names.

The minutes of the preceding meeting
were read and on motion were approved.

All bills on file were read and referred
to their respective committees.

All communications on file were read
and considered; also the report of the
grand jury, which was as follows:

To the circuit court of DuPage county:

Your grand jury respectfully reports
that it has found thirteen true bills, and
five no bills, and would further report that
it has carefully inspected the poor farm,
the jail, and the court house, and finds
them all in excellent condition.

Your grand jury wishes further to state that
the most sincere thanks are due from this
county to its board of supervisors, not
only for the good care of the county property,
but also for the handsome, commodious and complete home afforded for the
courts and county records.

We deem especial praise is due the board for the in-
telligence it has shown, the pains taken,
and the diligence exercised in the per-
formance of its duties in this regard.

The particular design and general convenience
of our new court house deserves special
commendation. Your grand jury would
recommend the erection of a new build-
ing on the poor farm for the insane. Also
that the old building for county offices be
removed and that a vote of thanks be ex-
tended to the officers in charge, including
the state's attorney, sheriff, deputies, etc.

Those astonishing reports from Wash-
ington just after the meeting of congress
which indicated that the Hawaiian an-
nexation proposition was likely to fail
cannot stand the test of examination.

Many of the men who were regarded as
opposed to the treaty are now indicating a
disposition to support it, and the chief op-
position yet remaining comes from those
who are unwilling to look with favor upon
anything originating with the republican
party, as this proposition does.

Japan has concluded to withdraw her protest,
since she sees that the United States is
really in earnest about it, and that inter-
ference by her would unfavorably affect
her present friendly relation with the
United States.

The republicans in congress and the
departments are moving in the direction of
rigid economy in government expenditures
and the appropriations for the current fi-
nancial year are likely to be considerably re-
duced. This fact adds to the probability
that the Dingley law is going to prove am-
ple in its revenue-producing capacity. In-
deed, the members of the committees
which framed it are unanimous in their
agreement with treasury officials that it
will meet the requirements of the govern-
ment and that no further revenue legisla-
tion will be necessary.

One of the encouraging signs of increasing
prosperity is the fact that the stock of
the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad
company touched par last week, and that
the advance was based solely upon the
solid increase in the earnings of the road
during the past few months. This is but
in keeping with the "signs of the times."
