

MINOR EVENTS OF THE WEEK

Items of General Interest Told in Paragraphs.

COMPLETE NEWS SUMMARY.

Record of Happenings of Much or Little Importance from All Parts of the Civilized World—Prices of Farm Products in Western Markets.

At least 15,000 persons visited Memorial hall in Chicago Monday, and with bare heads filed past the catafalque whereon rested the remains of the late Major John A. Logan.

A company has been organized to construct an irrigating plant near Wichita Falls, Texas, with a capacity of irrigating 10,000 acres of land in Wichita valley.

Commissioner-General Peck said that a Washington dispatch printed in a daily paper Friday morning to the effect that he had opposed the appointment of the Mrs. Potter Palmer as one of the twelve honorary representatives of the United States at the Paris exposition, was false and absurd.

The provost marshal has taken charge of Frankfort, Ky., at the request of the republican adjutant-general. The president refused Taylor's request for interference.

A jury has been secured at La Grange to try the Kahr murder case in the Circuit court.

Fire which originated in McKelroy's furniture rooms in the business portion of Youngstown early Friday morning, destroyed property valued at \$50,000.

On Tuesday night Miss Cora Crane, 21 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Crane of Brant Center, Mich., went out to visit a neighbor about 100 rods away from her home.

The government of the British South Sea has ordered the black troops in Sarawak at Omdurman to return to the store all ball cartridges that had been turned out to them.

Julius Courtney is under arrest at Memphis, Mo., charged with the murder of William Hill, by giving him a drink of beer containing strychnine.

Timothy M. Walker of Omro, Wis., and his son, Millard T. Walker, a machinist in Oshkosh, Wis., have received notice that they are sole heirs to a fortune of nearly \$100,000 in cash and gilt-edge securities.

While cleaning a dough mixer in a bakery at Toledo, Ohio, Thursday night, Henry Rump was caught in the machinery and ground to fragments.

The board of directors of the Manufacturers' club, composed of the wealthiest business men of Philadelphia, adopted resolutions expressing approval of the work done by the subcommittee of the Citizens' National Association.

CASUALTIES.

The man whose body was shipped from Baltimore to St. Louis City in a packing box was not murdered. He died at City hospital in Baltimore three hours after he had been struck by a trolley car on Dec. 29 last.

Harry Reese fell into a steam vat at the Butler basket factory in Auburn, Ind., Friday, and was horribly burned, the flesh falling from his person.

Sister Stanislaus, a teacher, and Mary Foley, a pupil, perished in a fire in St. Lawrence O'Toole's parochial school in St. Louis Thursday afternoon. An early report that twenty-five pupils had perished was unfounded.

CRIME.

The condition of Col. David G. Colson, who has been overlooked by the papers since the attempted assassination of Senator Goebel, is not at all satisfactory to his physicians.

Word from Glasgow, Mo., says that robbers entered the Chicago & Alton depot there and were robbing the safe, when they were frightened by the approach of a freight train, dropping \$500 as they escaped.

At the Alhambra theater in Milwaukee Saturday night an actress who attempted, while waving a British flag, to sing a song in praise of the Anglo-American alliance was hissed off the stage.

A warrant drawn up in human blood was served by Detective Reedy of the Stock Yards police station in Chicago Sunday afternoon on Martin Grogan, 4256 Emerald avenue, who is charged with assault and battery by William Sanderson, 814 Forty-seventh place.

In his sermon in the cathedral at Baltimore Sunday Cardinal Gibbons scored society women and female suffragists as the greatest enemies of the female sex.

Arthur Sewall, Bryan's running mate in 1896, said in an interview at San Francisco that America must hold the Philippines, come what may, and that no other course is open to the administration.

The snowfall in Chicago Saturday night and Sunday was so great as to cause a partial suspension of street traffic.

Former Secretary of War Alger, in an interview at Detroit said: "It is most unfortunate and in exceeding haste for the public men of the United States to mix up in the affairs of South Africa at the present juncture. At a peace meeting held in Carnegie hall, New York, Thursday night, resolutions were adopted calling on the president of the United States to at once take steps to bring about peace between Great Britain and the Boer republics.

The firm of W. H. Bacheller & Co., of New Orleans, which has been doing a large business through the south, has been placed in the hands of a receiver. It had been a heavy handler of cotton. Its liabilities are estimated at \$500,000.

WESTERN CANADA.

Crop Prospects and Climate About Edmonton, N. W. T.—Interesting Letter from Mrs. S. A. Brigham, Late of Mason City.

The following extracts from an interesting letter to the Mason City (Ia.) Republican, written by Mrs. S. A. Brigham, late of that place, but now of Ross Creek, Alberta, Canada, so nearly describe most of the districts of Western Canada that we take pleasure in presenting same to the attention of our readers:

Ross Creek, Albert, N. W. T., Canada, Aug. 7, 1899. Editor Mason City Republican—Dear Sir: We are located in the Beaver Hills, 30 miles from Ft. Saskatchewan, 50 miles from Edmonton.

The Beaver Hills are covered with small green willows which are easily laid here and there poplar, birch and tamarack trees abound. Small meadows are numerous. The soil in these hills is much richer than the bottom lands, being a kind of black loam.

We have long days during the months of June and July; one can see to read many evenings until 10 o'clock in the twilight.

The winter season is one of great activity. All the fencing is gotten out then and logs for the farm buildings.

We are now in the midst of hay-making (Aug. 7). Wheat will not be cut until early September, this being a little later season than common, but a little later season than common, but a little later season than common.

The water is good. We have a fine well 15 feet deep. In the creeks the water is soft and of a yellowish color.

Now for the drawbacks (we have them), but nothing very serious. Mosquitoes are simply abundant, especially after a shower.

In conclusion, if the remainder of our loved ones were here with us, we should better enjoy life on Ross Creek, and unless the unexpected develops, consider this will be a pretty fair place to end our days.
