WEEK IN ILLINOIS.

RECORD OF HAPPENINGS FOR SEVEN DAYS.

at Vienna, Ill., Crowded with Spectators - Attorneys Whitnel, Clement. Fowler, Reid and Schwartz Address the Jury.

Cartervitte Case Argued,

Vienna, Ill., correspondence: Twelve addresses to the jury were made in the Carterville riot case. When court convened at 1:30 p. m. the court room was crowded with spectators, as it was known that Hon. L. O. Whitnel was to speak. For two hours he pleaded for the lives of the nine defendants. Judge W. W. Clemens and State's Attorney Fowler, of Williamson county, made arguments for the state. Attorney S. H. Reid, of Duquoin, made the closing appeal for the day. Judge W. W. Clement, of Marion, the first speaker, referred to the prejudice against the colored race. He said slave owners whipped the negroes for not working, and white miners killed them because they did work. He read a great deal of law on self-defense and conspiracy, and condemned labor organizations. He said the unions were breeders of anarchy. L. O. Whitnel, of Vienna, was the next speaker. He said he was not here to throw bouquets at the jury, but to assist them in arriving at a just verdict. He said the jurymen were trying these men for the killing of Rev. Floyd; that the evidence was conclusive that none of them had anything to do with it. He said before they could convict, a conspiracy must be shown, or it must be proved that these men were accessories. This had not been demonstrated to the jury. State's Attorney Fowler of Williamson county followed. He said he had been charged with persecution of the defendants, but such was not the case. Mr. Fowler implored the jury to do their duty, and he would be satisfied. S. H. Reid of Duquoin was the last speaker. He said the prosecution had taunted the defense with not having Kelly's mother here to prove her son was at home when the killing was done. He would tell them the reason. She was at home with smallpox, contracted from Brush's negroes He said Judge Youngblood in his opening statement to the jury, had laid down five propositions. Reid defied Judge Younghlood to show that a single one was proved by the evidence He asked what better time could have been selected for the negroes to burn Carlinville. While the twelve were raising a riot at the depot, in the south end of town, 200 Brush negroes on the north could have come in and laid the town in ashes.

Smallpex in Reformatory.

Pontiac, Ill., telegram: Two cases of smallpox have been found in the I linois state reformatory, and every precaution is being taken by the officials to suppress the disease. Both the prisoners are isolated and their surrounding is such that there is no danger of its spreading. The institution has been quarantined and no officer on duty either on the fence or in the yard is permitted to leave. The outside tower men and the driver of the freight wagons are the only exceptions. No inmate is or will be permitted away from the institution. There are now over 1,400 inmates in the reformatory and as the mail is very large it is carefully fumigated.

Rabbit Hunter Accidentally Killed. Sycamore telegram: Daniel Corey the 19-year-old son of W. H. Corey of Malta, was accidentally killed while he was out with his gun to hunt rabbits. He was standing in the box of a bob sled, when the sudden starting of the horses pitched him against the end gate. In this way the gun was discharged. The full load struck him in the side and caused his death.

Pro-Boer Meeting at Quiney. Quincy telegram: A pro-Boer meet ing was held in Turner hall, in this city. It was attended by more than 500 citizens. Mayor John A. Steinbach presided, and addresses were made by Rabbi E. Eppstein, Rev. Father Michael Brennan, William Fetgenspan and Rev. William Hallenberg and others. Resolutions of sympathy for the Boers were adopted.

Judge Robly D. Adams Is Dead. Fairfield telegram: Judge Robly D. Adams died at his home in this city this morning after an illness of more than two years. He was state senator from this district from 1885 to 1889. and was a member of the court of claims during Governor Fifer's administration. He leaves a widow and three

Banker Dreyer Again Convicted.

Chicago special: Edward S. Dreyer. former president of the bank of E. S. Dreyer & Co., and ex-treasurer of the West Park Board, was found guilty of withholding from his successor as treasurer \$316,000 of the West Park fund. The jury fixed his punishment at a term in the penitentlary.

Wankegan Wants Good Water.

Waukegan special: The proposal to extend the Chicago drainage channel up the north branch to Evanston, so as to drain that city, is interesting residents of this place. Wankegan's sewage is polluting Lake Michigan and damaging the water supply of Lake Forest, Highland Park and other points. It is suggested that the channel should be extended as far north as this city. A fine connection between the lake and this channel at the west is afforded here through the Wankegan river ravine.
