Attorney Slusser introduced an ordi nance amending section 1 of chapter 8 of the village ordinances to provide for the sale of liquor by druggists, for medicinal purposes, to minors upon the written order of parents, guardians, or family physicians. The ordinance was read and, on motion of Trustees Mochel and Pearsall, placed on its passage and carried. The ordinance is as follows: An orginance to amend Section 1 of

Chapter 8 of the Ordinances of the Village of Downers Grove revised and passed May 3rd, 1897, and as amended September 4th, 1899.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Directors of the Village of Downers Grove, in the County of Du-Page and State of Illinois, that Section 1 of Chapter 8, of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance for revising, amending and consolidating the general ordinances of the Village of Downers Grove, Du-Page County, in the State of Illinois, as amended by an ordinance of said Village passed September 4th, 1899, be and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows, to wit:

This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and legal publication. Passed April 2nd, 1900, Approved April 4th 1900.
