Belleville.—The trial of Charles Hastings, George Godfrey, John Logan, James McGerchin, Michael Kennedy (alias Harry Wade), Richard Frauke, John Bennett (alias Mack Baxter) and John Liddy, under indictment for the murder of Charles Barnickol, was begun in the circuit court, Judge Burroughs of Edwardsville presiding...
