All plank sidewalks shall be haid with plank not less than one and three-fourths inches in thickness, of even surface, and not less than six inches nor more than ten inches in width, laid crosswise, cut to a line on the edges; all plank walks less than six feet in width shall be supported by three pieces of not less than two by six inch pine scantling, free from sap, rot or large knots, resting on flat stone blocking, or cedar posts, as the case may require, well bound together at the joints, nailed to the stringers by four 20-penny wire nails, two to each stringer; and all plank walks over six feet and less than eight feet in width shall be supported by four instead of three stringers. 
