MRS. W. H. EDWARDS SUCCUMBS TO CANCER SUNDAY EVENING.

Funeral Services Are Held from Residence Tuesday Afternoon and the Interment made in Hinsdale Cemetery.

Mrs. W. H. Edwards, who had been ill for the past six months, died at her home, on Maple avenue, Sunday evening, July 29th, at 8 o'clock, from cancer, aged 49 years. She had long been a sufferer from her ailment, and though in the early part of last year an operation, performed at a Chicago hospital, gave temporary relief, the old trouble, in an aggravated form, returned in January and resulted in her death Sonday. For the past three weeks she had been confined to her bed, and it was known that only death could relieve her sufferings. Every kind attention and the most careful nursing that loving hands could perform was given her, and, surrounded by her family and loving friends, she passed to her reward.

. The funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the home on Maple avenue. Hundreds of sor rowing friends who had known and loved the many excellent traits of her character attended to honor the memory of the one now gone from them. Rav. Edgar H. Libby, pastor of the Congregational church, conducted the services. The services opened with a prayer by Rev. C. J. Pope, who was followed by Rev. T. R. Greene in a scriptural reading. Rev. Herbert H. Rood, of Chicago, former pastor of the de ceased, spoke feelingly of the noble attributes which predominated the life of her whose earthly trials had ended, touching briefly on the beauty of her christian character, which was exempliffed in her daily life. The services closed with a favorite song by Mesdames E. H. Libby and Jonas Foster. The remains were taken to Wright's cometery, at Hinsdale, and laid beside those of her boy, Harry, to whose sudden death, two years ago, she had never quite become reconciled.
