Enterprise Representing Enpenditure of \$250,000-Successful Management of H. L. Kramer.

Ten years ago the ground where the magnificent hotel property of the Indiana Mineral Springs Company is locatted at Indiana Mineral Springs, Indiana was wholly unimproved and almost a wilderness. Now, owing to the discovery of the valuable medicinal qualities of the springs and the healing virtue of the soil itself, together with the enterprise of Major H. L. Kramer, there is located there one of the finest sanitariums in the United States. The natural picturesque surroundings have been made more attractive and the hotel is a model of comfort and elegance.

For the greater accommodation of guests who come in constantly increasing numbers from every section of the United States, arrangements have now been made for the enlargement of the hotel buildings. The contract was let yesterday by Major Kramer for additions that will cause an outlay of over \$30,000. The improvements will consist of a new bath house and an addition to the hotel. The addition will be two stories in height and will occupy a ground space 80x160 feet. It provides forty additional guest chambers. The entire addition will be handsomely and elegantly furnished. The bath house, when completed, will be the finest in the United States.

Besides the bath house and the guest chambers there will be on the first floor a dining hall, a music room, a billiard hall, physician's offices and a barber shop. In connection with the bath house there will be ladies and gentlemen's dressing rooms and cooling rooms. The dressing and cooling rooms will be elaborately decorated and the floors will be laid in white tile. In both cooling rooms will be built large ornamental fire places which will be used for heating purposes in addition to the regular steam heating. The work will be entirely completed in 90 days.

The improvement and the entire arrangements of the hotel and grounds are made, keeping in view the artistic effect of the whole, and when the improvements arranged for are completed the hotel and surroundings will be much more attractive than before.

Major Kramer states that a still further addition to the hotel is contemplated, and that plans are now being prepared for an additional structure to contain 150 rooms for guests.

Already a quarter of a million dollars has been expended on the Indiana Mineral Springs enterprise and under the present management greater growth and development in the future is assured.—Attica Daily Ledger.

HALE'S PET CHARITY.

FAMOUS AUTHOR NURSES SICK CHILDREN.

The Great American Philauthropist Is Not Averse to Practicing That Which Preaches -- Boston's Floating Hospital.

(Special Letter.) Boston's floating hospital has for its president that great-hearted philanthropist, the Rev. Edward Everett Hale, and he is not a mere figurehead of a president. He is genuinely interested in the work of the hospital and has made more than one trip on the hospital boat, where he goes about among the sick bables and their mothers speaking a word of cheer and carrying out his own doctrine of lending a hand to the needy and the suffering. The little tot on Dr. Hale's lap is one of the sick hospital babies, and the photograph was taken one day when Dr. Hale was on board the floating hospital, which has become one of the best-known and most deserving of all Boston charities. From July until late in September the floating hospital leaves the Boston wharf every day with all of its little white beds and cots filled with sick babies, who are taken away from the stifling air of the heated tenements into the cool and refreshing air of the ocean.

The hospital is a very large barge pulled by a tugboat to avoid the noise and dirt and unpleasant odor of machinery. Last year nearly 3,000 sick children were taken on trips down the harbor. Some of them were kept on board several days or until they were well enough to go back to their homes, This year the hospital began its trips with twenty-one trained nurses and a regular medical staff. It is supported entirely by voluntary offerings. It is a part of the work of the Lend-a-Hand society, of which Edward Everett Hale is president, and it is one of Dr. Hale's "pet charities."

Although now in his 78th year Dr. Hale is still actively engaged in all sorts of charitable enterprises, and he is ready to speak at any time or in any place for suffering humanity. He is a striking figure on the streets of Boston with his tall and massive form, his long gray hair and grizzled beard. In the winter time he wears a cloak, and he always wears a wide-brimmed

Bond-Makers

which Mr. Robert Louis Stevenson addressed to the Samoan chiefs in order to induce them to take to road-making. and to turn from fighting to the works of peace. It shows that Mr. Stevenson't good-heartedness was a real and practical thing, not a mere garment of the spirit: "Chiefs! On this road that you have made many feet shall follow. The Romans were the bravest and greatest of people; men mighty with their hands, glorious fighters and conquerors. To this day in Europe you may go through parts of the country where all is marsh and bush, and perhaps after struggling through a thicket you shall come forth upon an ancient road, solid and useful as the day it was made. You shall see men and women bearing their burdens along that even way, and you may tell yourself that it was built for them perhaps fifteen hundred years beforeperhaps before the coming of Christby the Romans. And the people still remember and bless them for that convenience, and say to one another, that as the Romans were the bravest men to fight, so they were the best to build roads.

"Chiefs! Our road is not built to last a thousand years, yet in a sense it is. When a road is once built, it is a strange thing how it collects traffic, how every year, as it goes on, more and more people are found to wall thereon, and others are raised up to repair and perpetuate it, and keep it alive; so that perhaps this road of ours may, from preparation to reparation, continue to exist and be useful hundreds of years after we are mingling in the dust. And it is my hope that our far-away descendants may remember and bless those who labored for them




