There is still something to be thankful for, even though the cemetery continues to adorn Main street. The directors are making a few improvements in its appearance.

The campaign of 1896 was fought on two great issues—sound money vs. a debased currency and a protective tariff vs. free trade. These are still live issues, and in fact, the issues. Mr. Bryan, in addition to the declaration of his party platform, stood then as he does now, preeminent personally for both.

History has now recorded the fact that American troops have entered four foreign capitals as conquerors—Mexico city, Havana, Manila and Peking. And everywhere the American flag has gone it floated as a symbol of freedom and respect of law. America's influence in the world for good is now greater than it has been at any time in the past history of the country.

President Root of the Village board, has taken a very sensible way of determining the difficulties of the satisfactory appointment of police officers, which has caused some contention between the president and members of the board. A circular has been issued asking business men to state their preferences; the result will no doubt settle the question satisfactorily to all concerned.

It will be interesting to see what stand the members of the Grand Army of the Republic will take regarding Gen. Shaw's recommendation that the date for the observance of Memorial day be changed so that the commemorative exercises shall fall each year on a Sunday. Gen. Shaw's request for this change springs from a sentiment that will be generally understood and respected. There has been a growing tendency to treat all legal holidays for recreation and pleasure-seeking. Memorial day, like the rest, has been given over at various times and places to sports and junketing.

The situation in China continues to show improvement, and the resene of the besieged in Peking has been accomplished. This very serious affair has been handled from the beginning in a masterly manner by the President and Secretary Hay. American diplomacy has received striking vindication and won high distinction before the world, and its success cannot fail to shed great lustre upon its able sponsors. It was through the efforts of our government that communication, though limited with the foreign ministers, was restored, and the relief column enters Peking under the stimulus of American energy.

The Reporter urges the propriety and the desirability of organizing a Republican club for the present campaign. But little more than two months remain before the national election, so that it is time steps were taken for such an organization. The campaign throughout the state will be formally opened Sept. 1st and Downers ought to have a club organized before that date, and a Republican club ought to make a vigorous campaign for the next two weeks. Let the matter be talked up now, when a meeting has been called to organize for the campaign, let every Republican in the surrounding country be present and aid by his counsel in starting out on the most momentous campaign this country has ever seen since that of Abraham Lincoln.

The Grand Army of the Republic, which this week is holding the greatest encampment yet known in the history of the organization, has had a career that stamps it as unique in itself, without reference to the exceptional nature of the great events, from which it took its rise. A society of nearly 300,000, held together entirely by community of sentiment and a spirit of mutual helpfulness, its existence has been a perpetual reminder of the strength of the bonds, the intensity of the patriotic spirit which united the men engaged in the civil war. Considering the nature of their experience, it is not surprising that the bond among the veterans should be so strong. Their reunions commemorate events which loom large in the world's history. It is in the memory of these things and in the reflection, too, that the organization from the present time on must dwindle with increasing rapidity that the public at large take pleasure in doing them honor.

INTERESTING NEWS NOTES TAKEN FROM EXCHANGES

Matters of Prominence Concerning People and Places in DuPage County and Surroundings.

C. E. Kinney, a resident of Bloomingdale in the forties, and the last Democratic Representative elected from this county, died at Kansas City a few weeks ago.

The general prosperity of the farmers in all parts of the county, north, south, east and west, resulting from good crops and good prices is a legitimate vote maker for the republican party. The Lord gave the good crops, and the republicans gave the good markets, and no amount of political misrepresentation can deprive either of the credit due.

The valuable team belonging to Mark Smith, was killed at Fischer's crossing Saturday, by the West Chicago Passenger going west about 10:30. The boy who was driving them evidently got rattled and did not know what to do. He was thrown some distance, but received no serious injury. The team was one of the finest in this section, and for which Mr. Smith had refused \$300 but a few days ago.

The old settlers of DuPage county will hold their annual reunion Friday, September 7th. Everybody is invited. The old settlers will be pleased to see every candidate for office, irrespective of party, from president of the United States down to coroner of DuPage county. An unusually fine program is being prepared of which further notice will appear in these columns next week. But remember the reunion and attend.

The village of Bloomingdale is having a monkey and parrot show in its village council. The matter of grading and graveling a street was brought before them for consideration, and the matter of using certain gravel was also a bone of contention. Three of the members wanted that of a certain gravel pit used and the other three wanted that of another pit. The defeated members withdrew from the council and resigned. A special election will be held next week to elect three village trustees.

Philip Corel, a farmer living 1 1/2 miles east of this city, had a horse badly bitten by a mad dog last Monday. Dr. Fry was called to attend the bitten animal and cauterized the wounds. Mayor Scott on hearing of the accident, at once detailed Marshal Daniels and officer Laird to round up the rabid canine and rid the community of so dangerous a pest. They skinned the dog and buried it in the evening, when they found the animal corralled in a cornfield with several farmers well armed keeping close watch for his appearance.—Clarion.

Last Saturday morning at the 5:30 train was approaching Winfield, a man was struck on the track about one mile west of the station. The train picked up the injured person, who gave his name as Charles Gusman, aged about 40 years, was a resident of Chicago, and had been visiting a brother at Elgin. He had slept in a box car at West Chicago on the night preceding the early morning accident, and was walking to Chicago. Gusman was brought to Wheaton, and upon examination by the physicians, a leg was found broken, but the greatest injury was to his back which was literally crushed. His injuries were dressed, and after being made as comfortable as possible, was taken to St. Luke's hospital by the railroad company where he died in the afternoon.

When we read and re-read that inspired document known as the Kansas City platform, we confess that we fear for our country, and see nothing but blue ruin ahead. But we pluck up courage again when we turn to the democratic platform of 1888, which solemnly declared:
