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NO MATCH FOR DOLLIVER. DR. HIRSCH FOR YATES.

Soberly Jerry Simpson is Severely Scourged by the Brilliant Iowan.

The debate recently held at the Lithia Springs assembly, near Shelbyville, between Congressman Dolliver, of Iowa, and Jerry Simpson, the sockless demagogue of Kansas, will not be forgotten in many a day. Simpson will never forget the trouncing he got, nor will the people forget the wonderful eloquence, sarcasm and irony of Dolliver, who is simply a marvelous speaker. Simpson was no match for the brilliant Iowan, who hewed to the line and left Jerry's hide nailed to a tree, shot full of holes. Here are some of the bright things Dolliver said: "I'm glad that I belong to a party that has never had, directly or indirectly, any trouble with the United States army or the flag."

"This is the first year you ever heard the democrats have a good word for Abraham Lincoln. They are to be congratulated that at the end of this gloomy century they have caught up with the middle of it."

"My sympathies are with the American boys in blue who are fighting for the flag, and not with those who are shooting them down."

"I am sorry for the Filipinos. I wish they had better counsel at home and better advisers in America."

"The American soldier is the American schoolboy with a gun—not half as dangerous as a boy orator with an unbridged dictionary."

"God bless the American soldier wherever he is camped to-night."

"Once in every four years we have one great duty to perform, and the democrats assist in making our duty easy by never taking up the same question more than once."

"The democrats elected Cleveland and proceeded to lift our burdens. Very soon they gave the workingman unlimited leisure."

"Four years ago Bryan said prices were too low. The republicans agreed with him and have raised them up."

"Four years ago Bryan cried free silver at 16 to 1 without the consent of anyone. Now it is absolute silence on that subject by unanimous consent."

"The democrats urged us to go to war, but we saw the consequences—in advance—the armless slaves, the broken-hearted mothers, the sorrow that must come to many homes. But the war is nearly over. There only remains a small remnant of insurgents on the island of Luzon and at Medicine Lodge, Kan. (Jerry Simpson's home)."

"God help a man who has not a higher conception of patriotism than hatred of another nation. Why should we hate England now? At this moment our minister to China, Mr. Conger, his family and hundreds of American citizens are seeking safety from the furious Chinese Boxers in the British legation under the British flag at Peking."

"A nation is not a mere territory; a nation is a moral personality. The highest ideal of a nation is when it pours itself out to the service of the world."

STABLE FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

Under McKinley's Administration It Will Be Established in the Philippines.

We certainly are in possession of the Philippines. What shall we do with them? Mr. Bryan says that if he is elected president, he will call a special session of congress to determine what we shall do with them and that he will recommend to congress the policy of granting to them "complete independence," while at the same time we as a nation are to "insure to them a stable form of government."

How can we grant them "complete independence"—which, if it means anything at all, means absolute freedom from any interference whatever on our part, while "insuring to them a stable form of government."

The two clauses of Mr. Bryan's deduction contradict each other. If we are to "insure a stable form of government" to the Philippines, we must keep troops there to protect the "form of government" from overthrow by foreign powers or by domestic revolution. If we keep troops there to prevent Aguinaldo's or any other native chieftain's "form of government" from overthrow by foreign powers or by rival chieftains, then we do not grant "complete independence."

The plain common sense of the situation is just this: Either we must abandon the Philippines absolutely, which is not to be thought of, or we must continue to do exactly what we are doing. That is to say, we must first suppress Aguinaldo's rebellion, and then maintain "a stable form of government under American control."

Overwhelmingly Republican.

Judge Longenecker, of Chicago, department commander of the Illinois G. A. R., while on his way to Mattoon, took a straw vote on the train, which resulted: McKinley, 109; Bryan, 9; noncommittal, 17. Judge Longenecker says he finds the same overwhelming sentiment for McKinley and good times wherever he goes and there is no doubt as to the glorious victory for the republican party this fall.

Gags at Kansas City Platform.

William Bourner, aged 83, a wealthy land owner of Seminary township, Fayette county, and a lifelong democrat, has renounced Bryan and come out squarely for McKinley, Yates and expansion. Mr. Bourner says he cannot swallow the Kansas City platform. He says he will not only vote for McKinley, but will use his influence to persuade others to do likewise.

Commerce of Silver Centenets.

DR. HIRSCH FOR YATES.

The Noted Jewish Leader of Chicago Earnestly Endorses Republican Ticket.

Rev. Dr. Emil G. Hirsch, the noted Chicago Jewish leader and preacher, in a letter to a friend, who wrote to him asking his opinion on several political questions, declares himself in favor of McKinley for president of the United States and of Yates for governor of Illinois. Dr. Hirsch says he will vote for McKinley and for Yates because he thinks their election would best subserve the interests of the country. His letter was written to 1. Blumenthal, No. 14, Traders' building, Chicago:

"I cannot make up my mind, because some details of my party's policy fall in my approval to certain directions of the nation's affairs to a party whose fundamental principles on almost every question are diametrically opposed to what I deem essential for the continued prosperity of our country. Of matters which cannot frighten me; the day will never dawn when conscription will be thought of or proposed or enforced by any president or law in this republic. I do not like the position in which we find ourselves with reference to the Philippine Islands."

A Dishonorable Course.

"But calm study of the matter has confirmed my first impression that there was no helping of the difficulties unless we had resolved from the very outset to leave the Philippines to their own fate. To do this would have been dishonorable, and I would have amounted to shirking a responsibility for a situation which we helped to create. It would have exposed every white resident of the island to such treatment as is now accorded to the foreigners in China by the party of Chinese independence, the Boxers. Nor would our abandonment of the islands have led to their independence or to the greater happiness of the people. Some foreign power or other would speedily have stepped up to the mark, under no other pretext than that civilization demanded the cessation of bloodshed, which undoubtedly would have ensued immediately upon the departure of our troops. The democratic platform does not declare that we have no duties in the islands. It asserts that we are responsible to the world for the establishment of a stable government there, and also for the continuance of the independence of that government from foreign aggression and interference."

Points Out the Fatal Mistake.

"I could understand that we might declare ourselves for immediate abandonment of the islands without further care for their government or future fate. But the scheme of our opponents amounts to saddling upon us a responsibility without corresponding authority and without the possibility of protecting ourselves against the follies or wickedness of the Philippine people. Without the consent of the powers we cannot establish a protectorate. If we do establish one without the consent of the other powers, we must be prepared to have our claim disputed and our desires ignored. This will lead to interminable difficulties. It will force us to be prepared to go to war at any moment with any power. This will open the door to the very militarism which our opponents so loudly denounce."

"We should have to be ready to draw the sword in behalf of the Philippine people without the slightest right to direct their affairs in a way which will avoid trouble with other nations. I see only one way for us to save our honor and business in the Philippines, then it is not our affair to see to it that a stable government be established there, and it is not our business to protect them or to have any of their responsibilities. If we have any business there, then for our own sake it is essential that our authority shall not be less than our responsibility."

Prefers to Trust McKinley.

"For these reasons I agree with Senator Hoar. I prefer to trust McKinley and influence the policy of my party later in a way to give the distant islands the best and freest government possible. I cannot trust a party that has been instrumental in forcing the adoption of the treaty in the senate and now holds the president responsible for doing his duty. That treaty made the islands the property of the United States. The president had under that treaty no choice but to enforce obedience to the laws of the United States. I cannot trust a party which is so anxious for the rights of the Philippines and tramples these sacred rights under its feet in our own hands in the south. The consent of the governed is apparently not required when the governed are negroes. I cannot confide in the promises of a party that would dishonor the faith of our land and build upon a foundation of financial insanity."

The "Cut and Run" Policy.

"Had I the decision I should willingly abandon the islands, but as this course would amount to pure selfishness and to an ignoring of responsibilities which we have created or which have come to us in the course of a war for which none clapped more loudly than the democratic party, should probably be alone in my decision to run away. The democratic platform does not propose to take the only logical step, namely, pure and simple abandonment; it will impose upon us a duty without the corresponding right."

"But now to your second query. I have the highest esteem for Mr. Alschuler. I never have had the honor of meeting him, but all that know him are unanimous in testifying to his nobility of character and his ability. Were his a mere administrative business, I should certainly weigh these qualifications. His opponent is of equal eminence and fitness, however. In the hands of either the affairs of the state will be safe."

"But the governor's is a political office. He may under certain circumstances have the right to nominate a senator. He thus might find the opportunity to influence national legislation on finance and foreign policy and the like. Therefore, in my choice for governor, I must weigh all political principles. I cannot give my vote to a gentleman, however high his character, who stands for measures which I deem radically wrong."

No Political Judaisms.

"The fact that I am a Jew and Mr. Alschuler is of Jewish parentage cannot influence my action. I do not vote as a Jew, but as an American citizen. What would we say if Methodists would appeal to their coreligionists to support a Methodist because he is a member of their church? If we are so foolish as to vote for a Jew simply because he is a Jew we must be prepared to have others vote against Jewish candidates because they are Jews. Judaism teaches loyalty to principles. Those who are democrats I should certainly vote for Mr. Alschuler, and in so doing would find pleasure and take pride in the thought that I had voted for a Jew for the religious family whose patriotism and honesty are so often doubted—was recognized to be well qualified for so high and honorable a trust."

"But as I am not a democrat, and as I believe that in the present crisis it is well not to swap horses, I cannot give Mr. Alschuler influence in any other way than to lead me to cast my ballot for Judge Yates while admiring the character and ability of his opponent as much as any man may."

Yates an Ideal Candidate.

"Mr. Yates, I am sure, will make an faithful and capable governor of Illinois. There is and there ought to be no such thing as a Jewish vote. It is as infamous as would be a Catholic vote. Hebrew marching clubs, no matter under what banner, are an insult to the spirit of our institutions. We vote as citizens and not as members of religious fraternities. Those who are afraid of religious intolerance will have cause to regret their fanaticism or their enthusiasm. Today they are shouting 'Yates' and tomorrow others, non-Jews, will plead with non-Jews against Jews.
