INTERESTING NEWS NOTES TAKEN FROM EXCHANGES.

Matters of Prominence Concerning People and Places in DuPage County and Surroundings.

Judge Batten and States Attorney Slusser discussed the issues of the campaign in Gymnasium hall, Lombard, Saturday evening, Sept. 29.

Mail boxes for the street and other paraphernalia for the free delivery of mail in Wheaton have arrived. Free delivery went into effect Monday.

On Sunday an unknown man was found beside the Illinois Central railroad track about one mile east of Granger station, where he had been killed by the cars. There was not a scratch of writing on him as a means of identification. A half quart bottle of whisky in his pocket gave the best clue to the cause of the accident.

A man by the name of Hague while operating a threshing machine on the Ravlin farm, near Eola last Saturday, attempted to put on the belt which runs the band cutter while the machine was in motion. His foot caught in the machine and was torn off, his hip broken and other injuries received before the machine could be stopped.

John Smith, of Kansas, a lieutenant of the 105th regiment, Illinois, volunteers, is at Geneva visiting old acquaintances and comrades. Mr. Smith was wounded in the war of the rebellion, a rifle ball passing entirely through his body. He was given up by the doctors, but it has not happened that he has lived over thirty years longer than the doctor who said he must die.

THE NEXT COUNTY FAIR.

How would it work if the management of the next county fair were placed in the hands of farmers exclusively, asks the Clarion. Recent exhibitions having failed to give satisfaction or draw a crowd, why not give this annual exhibition over into the hands of practical, wide-awake, progressive, enterprising agriculturists. It is a fact which cannot be denied that the bottom has dropped out of the ordinary county fair. The present generation doesn't care a penny for belching beasts or prancing steeds. Everybody has been surprised with marvellous sights and vast aggregations of wonders. Even a seventeenth century building attracts but little notice and elicits faint expressions of surprise. There is no longer any rivalry between farmers. High grade stock is bred by specialists on a large scale, from which breeders can make selections to suit fancy and size of cash balance. Wheaton is centrally located, but is nevertheless a cross-country town. Travel, business and social intercourse follow railway lines. It costs more to go to Wheaton from many points in the county than it does to go to and return from Chicago, hence the attractions of a county fair seldom overcome the expense consideration connected therewith. The fair management should, therefore, be placed in the hands of farmers. Township superintendents could easily induce a score of neighbors to make entries in the several departments. Should such an arrangement fail to draw a paying crowd, the project might just as well be abandoned now as to wait until remains but unpaid premiums and complimentary tickets of admission that could not be given away.

VOTERS ATTENTION! REGISTER. The judges of election, will meet at the polling places in their respective precincts, on Tuesday the 16th day of October, A. D. 1900, for the purpose of making a registry of the legal voters of their respective precincts. Every voter should see that his name is placed on the register. The second and final meeting of the board of registry will take place on Tuesday, October 30, 1900, for the purpose of revision and adding any new names that may be presented to the board. These are the only days of registration. If you are not registered you will be compelled to swear in your vote on election day.

As a lawyer, a soldier, and a statesman he has achieved unusual distinction and has compelled the attention of the state and of the nation. He had held the high offices of governor of Illinois and United States senator from this state, and was chosen four years ago as the candidate for president of the gold wing of the Democratic party. He was among the last of the volunteer soldiers who attained high rank and distinction during the civil war, and the honors he achieved were much more varied than usually fall to the lot of any man.

Gen. Roosevelt has faced the bullets of San Juan Hill, has led his troops into the places of greatest danger when duty called and was not dismayed by any such mob attack in Colorado. The same courage that made him the hero of his regiment did not fail him when hooting raffians assailed him with clubs and stones, for in the midst of the hoodlums' work he openly rebuked them, and gave to them and to the whole country a sentiment in striking contrast with the ideas the mob was trying to carry out, when he declared he represented the party that stands for law and order.
