SIDEWALK ORDINANCE, NO. 54.

An Ordinance providing for a brick sidewalk on the south side of Maple avenue in the Village of Downers Grove, Illinois.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Downers Grove, in the County of DuPage and State of Illinois:

Sec. 1. That a sidewalk 23 feet in length be constructed on the south side of Maple avenue in said village immediately in front of the following described parcel of land, to wit: being a part of lot 4 of Assessor's subdivision of sections 7 and 8, Township 38, North Range 11 East of the Third Principal Meridian, DuPage County Illinois, and described as commencing at the northwest corner of a parcel of land now owned by Emerson O. Stanley, and occupied by him as a homestead, thence running westerly along the south line of said Maple avenue 23 feet, thence southerly parallel with the east line of said Maple avenue to a point in a line drawn through said lot 4 from the middle point of the east boundary line of said lot to the west boundary line of said lot and parallel with the south line of Maple avenue, thence easterly parallel with said south line of Maple avenue and 100 feet distant therefrom 23 feet to a point, thence northerly to place of beginning.

Sec. 2. That the entire cost of said sidewalk shall be levied upon said parcel of land.

Sec. 3. Said sidewalk shall be constructed under the supervision and to the acceptance of the Street Commissioner of said village, and the same shall be constructed five feet four inches in width of vitrified brick, as follows: The ground upon which said sidewalk is proposed to be laid immediately in front of said parcel of ground shall be thoroughly underdrained with good drain tile - inches in diameter and the foundation upon which the walk is to be laid shall be made of cinders 12 inches in thickness; said walk shall be made of vitrified brick each four inches in width, eight inches in length and two inches in thickness, of the kind made by the Streater Paving Brick Company of Streater, Ill., or equal and commonly known as "Impressed Pavera"; said brick shall be laid flat in sand and firmly imbedded therein, and shall so be placed that when the walk is completed the surface shall be reasonably smooth and sufficiently convex as to carry water falling thereon off the walk.

Sec. 4. That the owner of said lot or parcel of land is hereby required to construct said sidewalk in front of his said property, agreeably to the provisions of Section 3 of this ordinance, within thirty days after the publication thereof.

Sec. 5. Upon default of said owner to construct that part of said sidewalk immediately in front of his said parcel of land within thirty days after the publication of this ordinance, it shall be the duty of said Street Commissioner to cause the same to be constructed in behalf of said village at the cost of said owner. The said Street Commissioner shall certify to a bill of the cost of said walk constructed by the village in front of said parcel of land, showing the separate items of the cost of grading, materials, laying down and supervision, and file it in the office of the Village Clerk, together with a description of said parcel of land on said sidewalk.

Sec. 6. The Village Collector is hereby designated as the officer to collect the special tax herein provided, and to whom warrants for the same shall be directed.

Sec. 7. The Village Clerk shall in all respects comply with the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of the state of Illinois entitled "An act to provide additional means for the construction of sidewalks in cities, towns and villages," in force in the State of Illinois, July 1st, A. D. 1875.

If said land is delinquent after return of warrant by Village Collector, it shall be the duty of said Clerk to make a report of such special tax in writing to the County Treasurer and ex officio County Collector on or before the 31st day of March, A. D. 1901, as required by said act.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and legal publication, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. Passed Oct. 1 1900. Approved Oct. 1 1900. Bert C. White, Village Clerk. F. A. Root, President.
