WAGES HAVE INCREASED

How Centralia Railroad Men Have Prospered Under Republican Rule.

The Centralia Sentinel presents a forcible argument for the election of McKinley, Yates and the republican ticket in showing the prosperity which the Illinois Central railroad boys have Louisville enjoyed at that place in the past four years, using for comparison the number of men employed and wages paid in August, 1896, under Cleveland's administration, and the same month of the present year, under McKinley, which is certainly fair. The figures are official, for they are taken from the payrolls. In 1896 all of the Central passenger engines were repaired at Centralia, but now they are sent to Burnside. In 1896 the number of men employed in the repair depart-Florida ment was 154. Now, with the decreased demand for men because of the change, there are 192 employed, an increase of 38. The men in this department in August, 1896, were paid \$6,592.62, as against \$8,573.36 this year, an increase of \$1,980.69 paid to Centralians. But the shop boys are not all that are strictly in it republican days. In 1896 there were but 197 engineers employed, while now there are 283. In August, 1896, the engineers got \$12,905.35, while in August this year they got \$20,575.88, an increase of \$7,670.53 for one month. In August, 1896, the total number of machinists employed in the shops was 20. Of these seven received 25 cents and over an hour, and 13 less than that amount. This last August the total number of machinists was 23, of which 18 received 25 cents an hour or over, and but five less than that

1896, was six corpenters, 12 being nine car inspectors and three cleaner a total of 30 men. In 1900, the month of August shows eight carpenters, one painter, 29 carpenter helpers, ten car inspectors and three cleaners, a total of 51. The carpenters, helpers, inspectors and car cleaners have all enjoyed an increase in wages, the advance in the pay in the central shops at Centralia running up into the thousands each month. The figures presented are the best possible proof that the dinner pail carried by the railroad men in Marion county to-day and that which they carried in the days of free trade and idleness are very different.

TILLMAN ON THE NEGROES.

Senator Tillman still continues in republican Illinois to defend the disfranchising of the negroes of his state. In Kewanee he deliberately said:
