ARCHBISHOP IRELAND'S ADVICE.

Archbishop Ireland, of Minnesota, on his arrival in New York from Europe, was besieged by inquiries as to how he intended to vote. In reply he gave out the following statement:

How do I intend to vote? It cannot at first sight but seem more or less impertinent for any citizen to tell the public how he intends to vote. In voting each citizen obeys the dictates of his own sense of civic duty; he should simply do this and leave to others to do likewise. However, since a certain number of newspapers have undertaken to say how I intend to vote, and in so doing have misinterpreted my intention, and have not been unwilling to make political capital out of my supposed vote, I will give to the question: "How I intend to vote?" a categorical and unmistakable reply.

I intend to vote for William Mc Kinley and Theodore Roosevelt. In giving my vote for the candidates of the republican party I am satisfied in my own conscience that I serve the best interests of the country at home and abroad; that I contribute to the maintenance of the country's material prosperity and of peace and good will between the several classes of its population; that I aid the country in bringing about the safest and most honorable solutions of the complex problems which confront it as the result of the late war, and in retaining for itself the exalted position which it holds at present, commercially and diplomatically, before other nations of the world. I trust no further doubts will be expressed as to how I intend to vote.

JUDGE YATES ON THE TRUSTS.

Judge Yates, in a speech at Monticello, touching on the trust question, said, in part: "I wish to talk to you a short time on a democratic text. I see it now right over there on a placard: 'Remember the trusts.' All right; we will remember them. We will remember the most cruel, most cowardly and contemptible trust that ever existed- the new York i c trust.

"'Remember the trusts' is the most absurd and insane cry I have ever heard. The only effective legislation against trusts has come from the republican party. In the year 1890 the Sherman antitrust law was piloted through congress by a congressman from Ohio, whose name was William McKinley. William J. Bryan has just I discovered that the trusts are an evil. You never used to see that placard, because Bryan never knew, apparently, that trusts were & an evil. Ten years ago McKinley was on guard against the trusts.

"Ten years ago, before William J. Bryan ever thought of trusts, William Mckinley was on guard guarding the homes of the American people. What did William J. Bryan do the next year, 1891? Anti-trust bills introduced into the democratic congress in 1891 were referred to the committee on ways and means; that committee was democratic, and a member of it was William J. Bryan. What did that committee do? It simply recommended the whole matter for consideration by the succeeding congress, knowing that the next congress would be republican.

"When the democrats had control of every branch of the national government in 1893 they neither exterminated nor controlled trusts. On the other hand, recently, when the republican party sought to pass through congress a constitutional amendment to enable congress to pass laws to prevent states like New Jersey, for example, from chartering trusts to do business in other states, democratic opposition prevented its passage."

DEMOCRATIC RECORD ON TRUSTS.

Every line of legislation now on the statute books of the United States directed against trusts and unlawful trade combinations was placed there by the republicans.

The last occasion on which the parties, as represented in congress, went on record on the trust question was on June 1, 1900. On that day a final vote was taken on a constitutional amendment to grant congress power to "define, regulate, prohibit and dissolve trusts,

monopolies and combinations, whether existing in the form of corporations or otherwise." It requires a two-thirds vote of congress to submit a constitutional

amendment to the state legislatures for ratification. The question to so submit it was lost by a vote of 154 year to 132 nays.

Of the year 149 were republicans and only five were democrats. The five were Campbell, of Montana; Naphen and Taylor, of Massachusetts; Scudder, of New York, and Sibley, of Pennsylvania.
