Preacher Accused of Murder, Sheriff J. F. Howells of Salt Lake has traced to Omaha the Rev. Francis Hermans, formerly pastor of the Swedish Lutheran church of Sait Lake, Utah. Hermans left Omaha five years ago for Salt Lake with Henrietta Clausen, who had helped him and his wife in church work at Omaha. When Hermans became pastor of the church in Salt Lake another young woman was admitted to his household as a servant. When the members of the congregation began to talk both young mysteriously disappeared. Prior to this Mrs. Hermans had died suddenly. Hermans was accused killing the two young women, cutting them up and burning the remains in the church furnace. His arrest is expected.

The new vessels will be of 20,000 tons register and 33,000 tons displacement, larger than any vessels in the world at the present time. The following are the principal dimensions of the vessels: Length, 630 feet; beam, 73 feet; depth, 56 feet. They have each five continuous decks extending the whole length of the ship, with three additional partial decks amidships. It is estimated that when completed the steamships will cost fully \$5,000,000.


