Let it be known all over the Union that no farming community can have free mail delivery until it has built good roads and the effort in one decade will be marvellous.

On the night of the election, Eugene Finch with others were receiving the election returns at West Chicago. When it was demonstrated that the Republican ticket had been successful, Mr. Finch went out and shot off several large cannon crackers that had been procured in anticipation of the result. One that he had lighted, he thought had gone out, and holding it in his hand prepared to light another match when it exploded, lacerating his hand badly and taking off the end of his thumb and second finger. The hand was healing and he was making preparations to go out, but on the following Wednesday there were indications of lock jaw, which, in spite of all that could be done, developed rapidly and caused his death Friday night, Nov. 16th.

Since that day in the fall of 1821, when the Pilgrim Fathers by public service returned thanks for the blessings of their first harvest, it has been the custom in the several states to have a day set apart by the governor, as a day of thanksgiving and praise. The observance of the day as an annual national event was first recommended by President Lincoln in 1863, and has since been followed as one of the unwritten laws of the land. It is an exclusively American custom, and as such is dear to the American heart. It appeals to us alike from patriotic and religious impulses, and from a simple sensible standpoint is welcomed by even him who pines lightly by either the palpit or the flag. It is observed exclusively, and it will live while the nation lives. In this year of 1900, next Thursday will be Thanksgiving day. Let us all look within our selves and dig a thank-offering out of some forgotten corner, if you haven't one in plain sight. It is there: all it needs is to be brought to the surface.

The Board of Supervisors considered the dairy at the county farm unprofitable and on Monday seventeen cows were sold at \$32 each, leaving ten cows in the county farm dairy. As they have a great deal of feed at the farm, about thirty feeders will be purchased to fatten. The election bills showed an average of \$57.50 per precinct. The additional cost incurred by supplies furnished by the county clerk will bring the election expense up to about two thousand dollars or almost one hundred dollars per precinct. C. D. Bartlett, C. B. Blodgett, Thos. Betz, James McClintock and County Clerk Lawrence were appointed as a committee to attend the convention of Supervisors which will be held in Joliet next February. The entire Board will perhaps attend. A proper place for insane in the county jail was ordered by the padding of a cell. As the county farm is not self-supporting the price of board was raised to \$2.10 for paupers and \$2.60 for the insane. The cows sold from the farm were reported as being exceptionally fine lot and were purchased by Mr. Harmering of Bartlett.

The republicans will have a majority on joint ballot in the next General Assembly of Illinois. They will be able to elect a republican senator. There is but one man whom they should consider and that is Sen. Cullin. He is entitled to a reelection, and it will now be in the power of his party to give him this coveted honor. His record in the Senate has been honorable to him self and useful to his State and party. He emphatically deserves another term, and it is in the interest of the people of Illinois that he should be his own successor. No other man taking his place would have the influence which he has possessed for the last ten or twelve years. He enjoys the confidence of the administration and of his brother senators. He occupies the postions on important committees. He has been faithful to all the trusts reposed in him, and he enjoys deservedly the confidence and esteem of the people. The last republican State convention declared in favor of his re-election. The republicans of Illinois demand the re-election of Senator Cullin, both because he is entitled to it and because he is the most valuable man for the place. It is almost certain now that he will command a majority of the votes in the republican members' caucus, and as republican members can afford to disregard the vote of a majority of the non-republican party elected to both Houses, Cullin's return to the Senate is a foregone conclusion. He will be for the next six years what he has been during his long career in the Senate—a credit to Illinois and to the Republic.

There has been filed with the supreme court an abstract of record and a brief in the case of James E. Cross, plaintiff in error, vs. the People. Cross was convicted at the October term of the Circuit Court of forgery. The note on which the alleged forgery was given by L. E. Ketchum of Eola, for medical treatment. Cross made a contract with him for this treatment and Ketchum signed a note for \$80. According to Cross' statement further complications were mentioned, hernia in addition to catarrh, and the original note was torn up and a new one for \$360 made and signed. This statement Ketchum denies and claims that he signed but the one note, and that the other is a forgery. Cross was indicted by the grand jury. Sheriff Gorham went out to his home in Nebraska and arrested him and brought him back without any objections on the part of Cross. At the time of the trial the original note could not be produced and the people had to rely upon a copy of the note. C. H. Wayne of Elgin, Cross' attorney, prepared the abstract and brief and took them to Judge MacGruder who, on looking them over, decided that the points were sufficient to grant a stay and enable the Supreme Court to go over the record. Just what action the Supreme Court will take is a matter of conjecture.
