Explosion Kills Eight.

Eight persons are known to have been killed, four are missing, and nearly two score sustained injuries more or less severe as the result of a boiler explosion which occurred in a laundry at No. 458 West Madson street. Chicago. The explosion occurred at 8:14, and the roar made by it could be heard for nearly a mile away. The force of the explosion completely wrecked the building occupied by the laundry and damaged adjacent struct nies. The roof of the laundry building was lifted high above the tops of the walls and when it settled down it buried the inmates of the place beneath a mass of debris, from which the dead and maimed were taken with difficulty. Most of the victims were young women, many of them scarcely out of their teens, who had been employed in the laundry. ## Glass Works Close Down.


