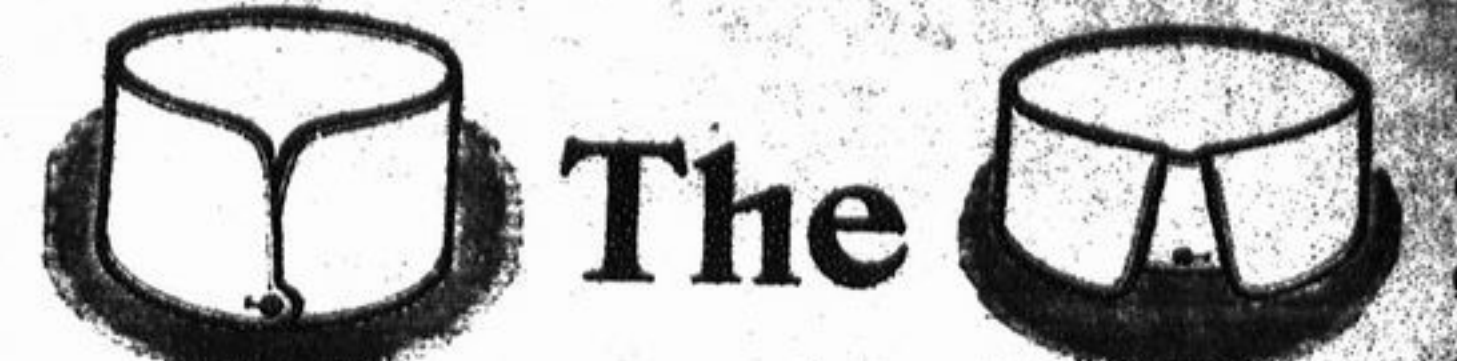
E. E. Downers desires the announcement made that the Downer field, on which so many games of base and football have been contested, will be closed this summer, owing to the land being placed under cultivation.
