INTERESTING NEWS NOTES TAKEN FROM EXCHANGES.

Matters of Prominence Concerning Places and People in Du Page County and Surroundings.

Work on the new \$45,000 Burlington railroad station at Riverside was begun this week. The old station was moved Monday to make place for the new.

Circuit court convened Monday with Judge Willis presiding. The March term pit jury is present, as the case of Goffrey vs. Ellen Joy, and the Johns forgery case are to be tried by them. The former case is a note claim in an estate.

Wm. J. Manning of Warrenville, is laying out a subdivision and will soon have lots for sale on the electric right of way. The depot will be located on his grounds. The new station will be about a half mile west of the present village.

Nettie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otis P. Graves, of Summit, was drowned Thursday by accidentally falling into a cistern located under the kitchen of the farm house. Deceased was 7 years old. The parents and other relatives are nearly distracted and have the sympathy of a large circle of acquaintances. The funeral was held from the residence in Summit Saturday. Interment in Sag cemetery.

The Chicago, Harvard and Geneva Lake railroad has been in operation two years, paying big dividends from the first, despite the fact that it has very few people along its right of way. The in and out freight of the line last year reached 600 full cars. It had 2,000,000 pounds of freight, and of butter and cheese it carried 40,000 pounds a month. With one refrigerator car it takes care of the five creameries. The road also has a mail contract.

John Parker, a resident of West Chicago for the past 35 years died Thursday, April 19th, 1901, aged 78 years and 9 months. The funeral was held from the Methodist church Sunday afternoon. Deceased was born at Bath, England, June, 1822, and at the age of 35 married Miss Ruth Cook. They came to this country the following year, and in 1856 came to this country. Mr. Parker leaves beside his widow, four daughters, three of whom reside in West Chicago.

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

The past week opened with cold weather, but temperatures have risen until warm, almost summerlike weather prevails at the end of this week. There has been practically no rain during the week, and the soil in the southern part of the state, where wet weather interrupted farming operations, has generally come into excellent condition for tillage. The very favorable conditions for farming operations have been taken advantage of, and such rapid progress has been made that farm work in some localities has come into a very reasonable condition of advancement. The warm weather has forced a rapid growth of vegetation, especially in those localities where the soil had not become rather dry, and good progress has been made by growing crops. Over the northern district and much of the central district rain begins to be badly needed, but as yet the effect of the dry weather has been shown only in a less rapid growth than would have otherwise taken place. The prospects for wheat and rye appear to be excellent. In a few localities damage by Hessian fly is still feared, but over most of the fly infested region there appears to be continued improvement in the prospects. Oat seeding is generally completed, though in a few localities where wet weather delayed this work, considerable seeding remains to be done. A decreased acreage will be needed in these localities. In many places oats are up and making good growth. Preparing corn ground has been the principal work of the week, and rapid progress has been made. Considerable corn has been planted in the southern district and some has been planted in both the northern and central districts. Grass is growing slowly and the crop generally looks well. Stock has been turned on pasture in many localities. Considerable potato planting and gardening has been done. Garden truck is growing nicely. Fruit prospects continue very fine, and trees are in bloom or buds are rapidly swelling over all the state. Some damage by frost of previous week is still feared in the southern district, but such fears have been lessened considerably during the week.
