Old Board Concludes Business and Adjourns-New Board Assumes the White Man's Burden.

old board of trustees, and the assuming of these duties and responsibilities by the new village officials, marked the beginning of the fiscal year of the village Monday night. The concluding business of the old administration was taken up and dispatched rapidly.

The reports of village officers were considered, and upon motion of Trustees Bunge and Klein, were placed on file. The treasurer's report showed balance on hand at last report of \$3, 851.87; receipts \$751.04; expenditures \$1,234.32; balance \$3,369,59.

The collector's report showed a total of \$252.04 collected for the month water rates \$67.27, electric lights \$117. 08, meters \$30.25, material \$1.44.

The superintendent of water and light reported 2.064,728 gallons of water pumped during month of April. Coal consumed was 56 tons, together with 25 gallons of engine oil, 15 gallons lubricating oil, 25 pounds of waste and power. 8 pounds of boiler compound.

Claim ordinance No. 103 providing for the payment of interest on bonds and miscellanous claims against the village to the amount of \$1,145.72 was passed after which on motion of Trustees Bunge and Klein the old board adjourned sine die.

Clerk Bert C. White called the new board to order. President Mochel, Trustees Waples, Klein. Kuenzel, Towsley, Stevens and Martin responded to roll call, and the oath of office was administered to the new members by Police Magistrate Graham. President Mochel called the board to order and named the following committees:
