WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

For the week ending May 13, 1901.-Good rains, following the continued dry spell which had threatened to become serions, have placed vegitation generally in a very favorable condition. Light rains have been very general throughout the state, but the beavier rains have fallen in local showers, which, while furnishing ample moisture in a few localities, have -left many places still too dry for the needs of vegitation. Farming operations have been interrupted in many places by rainy weath er, and the wet condition of the soil, though generally the delay from this cause has not been great. The condition of the soil for working has been greatly improved by the rains and is now generally excellent. The week has generally been cool, but not cool enough to retard the growth of regitation to any considerable extent. Preparing corn ground and planting corn continues to be the principal farm work. In many localities this work is almost completed, and over most of the state it is well advanced. In a few local ities, however, but little has been accomplished. The plant is coming up in many localities throughout the state and it is generally looking well. Wheat is making rapid growth and the prespects continue excellent. Danger from the Hessian fly appears to be diminishing, but many correspondents report that cent rains, and is now generally good. In a few localities, however, it continues ready for market. Potatoes are coming up nicely and in some places are ready for cultivation. Fruit prospects continue believed the apple crop will light. Some orchards in the southern districts are being damaged by coddling moth and canker worm. Strawberries will be a short crop in a few localities. This fruit is now ready for market in a portion of the south-


