ANSWERS THE FINAL SUMMONS EARLY SATURDAY MORNING.

Wife of Wm. Bryce Succumbs to Heart Failure-Funeral Held Monday-Interment at Forest Home.

Mrs. Jennie D. Bryce, wife of Wm. Bryce, died at her home, 218 East Maple avenue, Saturday morning, June 22, aged 48 years. The direct cause of her death was organic heart affectation from which she had been a sufferer for the past eighteen months. Two weeks ago she suffered a severe attack and had gradually failed until the end came at 3 o'clock Saturday morning.

At her bedside were her husband, her children, Jessie, Harry and Hattie Bryce, and Edward Dodd and Mrs. L. A. Dempsey of Chicago, her brother and Fisk. sister, who ministered to her last wants and did everything that tender care and filial love could suggest to make her last moments peaceful. The end was not unexpected and she was bravely prepared to meet it, repeatedly telling her family her going away was for the best. While her suffering was intense during the progress of the di sease, the end came peacefully. She became unconscious at 9 o'clock Friday night, and in that state death found her. Her daughter, Mrs. Ida Welch of Welsh, Louisiana, arrived Saturday evening too late to see her mother alive.

The funeral was held from the house Monday afternoon. A. E. Courtright directed the arrangements. The services were conducted by Rev. II. II. Rood assisted by Rev. T. R. Green of West Pullman. The latter gave the biography of her life and spoke feelingly of the many excellent traits which predominated in her character. He touched upon his relationship as her former pastor, telling of the many beautiful features of her life a life so tender and sweet in its nature, so lofty in its ideals, that no one could come in contact with her but that they would be benefitted. There were many friends both from Downers Grove and other points present at the obsequies, and probably many who would have loved to do honor to her memory, could not be present. The floral offerings were many and in keeping with the love and esteem in which she was held by her neighbors and friends. Interment was at Forest Home. A large cortege followed the remains to this lovely burial spot where she was laid to rest beside her three children who died in inlancy. The pall bearers were Mesars, W. . Herring, C. K. Roe, Geo. P. Luce, 11 W. Martin, J. C. F. Rommeiss and J W. Worley.

Jennie Dinning Dodd was born in Quebec, Canada, November 16, 1852, When a young woman she came to Chicago with her parents in 1869. She was married April 15, 1872, to Wm. Bryce and they came to Downers Grove seventeen years ago, making their home in north East Grove moving into the present home several years since. Seven children were born to them, three of whom are dead. She leaves beside those already mentioned, a brother, Wm. J. Dodd of Louisville, Ky. All were present at the funeral.

The death of this truly estimable woman is a real loss not only to the family but to a host of sorrowing friends. There was something in the cheerful openness and frankness of her nature that won the confidence of all with whom she came in contact, had a happy faculty of making friends and when they were made, she "grapsteal," Always cheerful, even in her best can best appreciate her kindly naian woman, and the world was better for her having lived in it. The news sorrow that will be lasting, and many friends will long mourn over the taking away of this tender, gentle, kindhearted and loving woman.
