NO PAPER NEXT WEEK.

The day of vacation is at hand. Clerks, doctors, lawyers, business men, clergymen and in fact nowadays nearly every one save the newspaper man, gets a couple of weeks off to build up their falling energies with a cessation of business cares for a short period during the heated term. The country newspaper man has no respite. He must stick to his post, because no one can fill his position, and the paper must be issued promptly each week.

Last year a number of weekly newspapers in Illinois innovated the custom of closing their offices and issuing no paper during one week in August, the month when business is least pressing, for the purpose of giving publishers and printers a breathing spell and an opportunity to get away from the daily grind of the newspaper office. The scheme was very successful wherever tried. Editors and publishers returned from their short vacations with renewed energies, and patrons were benefited by getting better papers.

This year the REPORTER will ask this concession of its patrons and will issue no paper the week of August 1st, and the office will do no job work the week started. As the date of publication falls on the first day of August, five publications of the paper would be the result, but in omitting the first week our advertising patrons will then receive the customary number of four insertions in the month. We feel sure our subscribers and patrons will not object to this method of allowing the REPORTER a vacation.

We trust our patrons will bear in mind the closing of the office for one week, when the office will not turn out any job work, nor issue a paper. Those in need of job work would do well to order at once as the office will be closed from Saturday evening, July 27th, until Monday August 5th.

The REPORTER believes that citizens may honestly differ in matters of politics, religion and medicine, for in these fields it is well understood that each one's way of thinking is the best, but there is no room for difference of opinion in the matter of plain duty of every citizen to stand for home institutions. Every dollar spent at home helps to swell the volume of our currency in the local channels of trade, and every interest in the city and every dweller in it is benefited by the impetus given to the local trade by plenty of money freely circulated. One dollar in circulation in the course of a day pays many dollars of debt and every dollar sent away is to that extent a blow on home interests. Citizens who buy away from home should consider this proposition thoughtfully.

A tremendous howl was raised a few years ago when the new waterworks were proposed. It was held to be a useless and extravagant public expense. Since then another pump has been provided. What would stir twenty-five hundred inhabitants to do now if these water supplies were not in existence. With all the wells and all the facilities for pumping the plant has to run almost night and day in order to keep the standpipes and reservoir full enough to meet the contingency of a conflagration. The authorities who provided the water supply builded better than they knew.

Considerable complaint is being made over the restriction placed by village authorities on street sprinkling in front of consumers residences from lawn hydrants. The consumers argue, and with good grounds, that no larger volume of water is used to sprinkle the streets than to water lawns and that they should be permitted to use the water for this purpose during the hours authorized for lawn sprinkling. During the present dry and dusty season permission to use water for this purpose would prove a great boon.

The building of permanent walks adds much to the appearance of residence property and the residents of East Maple avenue fully appreciate the fact. It is to be hoped that in a few years permanent walks will be the rule on all thoroughfares in this village.

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

For the week ending July 22nd, 1901.—The weather continued very warm and dry during the past week, and in the central and southern districts the temperature reached 100 degrees or above on several days. The drought was relieved to a considerable extent in the northern portion of the state, by light to ample showers, however, were very local in character and in many places there was no rain. In the eastern part of the state...

Light as to bring no relief. In the central district the showers were light and widely scattered, and in the south there were no beneficial rains. The week was favorable for harvesting, haying and thrashing and this work is nearing completion. The yield and quality of wheat has exceeded expectations in nearly all portions of the state. The oat harvest is about completed and although the reports indicate that the straw is generally short, the yield will be fair. Corn is beginning to show the effect of the long continued drought, especially in bottom lands, but not to such a great extent as was anticipated; the leaves are curling during the heat of the day in a great many cases, and in a few localities the top leaves and tassels are dying. Where the showers fell the corn was helped very materially, but the few showers, especially in the central and southern portions of the state did not seem to greatly affect the general condition of the crop. Almost all correspondents say that if good rains occur within a week or ten days the slight damage that the crop has thus far suffered will probably be repaired to a decided extent. Haying is about finished and the crop is light. Pastures are in poor condition and the farmers all over the state are feeding their stock. Gardens and potatoes have suffered very much, the damage being general. Apples continue to fall except where sprayed, and in some sections the crop is an entire loss. Peaches and grapes are promising to be a good crop. Berries have almost all dried up on the bushes. Stock water is growing scarce and wells are drying up in a number of places. Stock peas appear to be in fair condition.
