the Next Two State Conventions. Whether it is advisable or not, the facts are that the senatorial fight for Mason's seat is already on. Mason is a candidate to succeed himself, Dawes is an active candidate, and Madden is, to say the least, a receptive one. Chicago, of course, claims the right to name the senator and this right would doubtless be conceded. But, judging from the recent attempt to agree upon a gubernatorial candidate and the present condition of political affairs in that city, there seems no probability of an agreement upon a Chicago candidate to succeed Mason.

The scheme of politics in the state now seems to include both the governorship and the senator, and the friends of Governor Yates think that they and the governor ought to be for somebody for senator, with a view to lining up their forces trouughout the state. They do not think they ought to wait until the last minute before declaring themselves for some candidate for United States senator. Governor Yates is said to entertain this view and it is understood that on his return from his vacation he will call his chief advisers together with a view to perfecting an organization which will be effective in the control of the next two state conventions, name the United States senator and the candidate for governor.

It is generally understood that he will be warmly seconded in the matter by Lieutenant - Governor Northcott, Caunon, Hopkins, Warner, Prince, Hitt be a study of an old man by Rubens, and a majority of the Illinois congressional delegation, many prominent Chicago politicians and the original Yates men. The plan proposed contemplates an organization by countles, senatorial and congressional districts. GovernorYates has many loyal friends in the state. Many of them are powerful in politics in their respective districts, and to them will be intrusted the task of building up in their communities local organizations which will be stalwart in their republicanism and loyal to the governor. As to who this organization may eventually decide to support for senator is only hinted at. and these hints point to Lleutenant-Governor Northcott.

When Northcott was interviewed on the subject during a recent visit to Chicago with Governor Yates he said:

"I have not announced myself as a candidate for the senate. Some of my friends have been kind enough to mention my name as a possible candidate. and I now say that I think Cook county is entitled to the senstorship, and think Cook county can have the place if a suitable candidate should be presented by the Cook county Repub-Beans. It is too early yet to decide as to candidates for the senste. The election of a senator will not take nee until 1908, and many things not iiii anticipated may happen before

TRICKS IN THE SILK TRADE.

Now Shoppers Are Pooled-Tests

Which Show the Pure Material. Pure silk, when it has been through all the processes necessary to bring out all its good qualities, is worth its weight in silver, said an expert the other day. Therefore the women who expect to buy pure silk at little more than the price of cotton must expect to be fooled, and there are lots of ways by which the manufacturer gets even with

them. They make stuff that is called slik and passes for it with credulous persons who don't know any better out of nearly any old thing now. One favorite imitation silk is made of cellulose mercerized cotton which after treatment look something like silk, though of course they wear very differently, and their silken appearance soon van-

But it is in adulterating goods which really have some silk in them that the greatest skill is exercised to deceive the buyer. To obtain the required rustle and body rough floss is often used for the woof of the material. This soon causes it to wear shiny.

Another trick is to increase the sy silk material by using metallic salts Nearly every week in New York for in the dye vats. Pressing with some kinds of silk increases the weight also, but at the sacrifice of strength. Cheap, crackly, stiff silk which has heavy cords is good silk to avoid. It won't

In one variant or another it was a great favorite with Parket, often taking the exact form that Lincoln gave it, with his sure intuition of the best where there was any choice of words. In a speech delivered by Parker in 1850 we find it imbedded in a passage which might have been the inspiration of Seward's famous "irrepressible conflict" or Lincoln's "house divided against itself," a view to which Parker continually recurred. In two other speeches it stands "government of all the people, by all the people, for all the people." 
