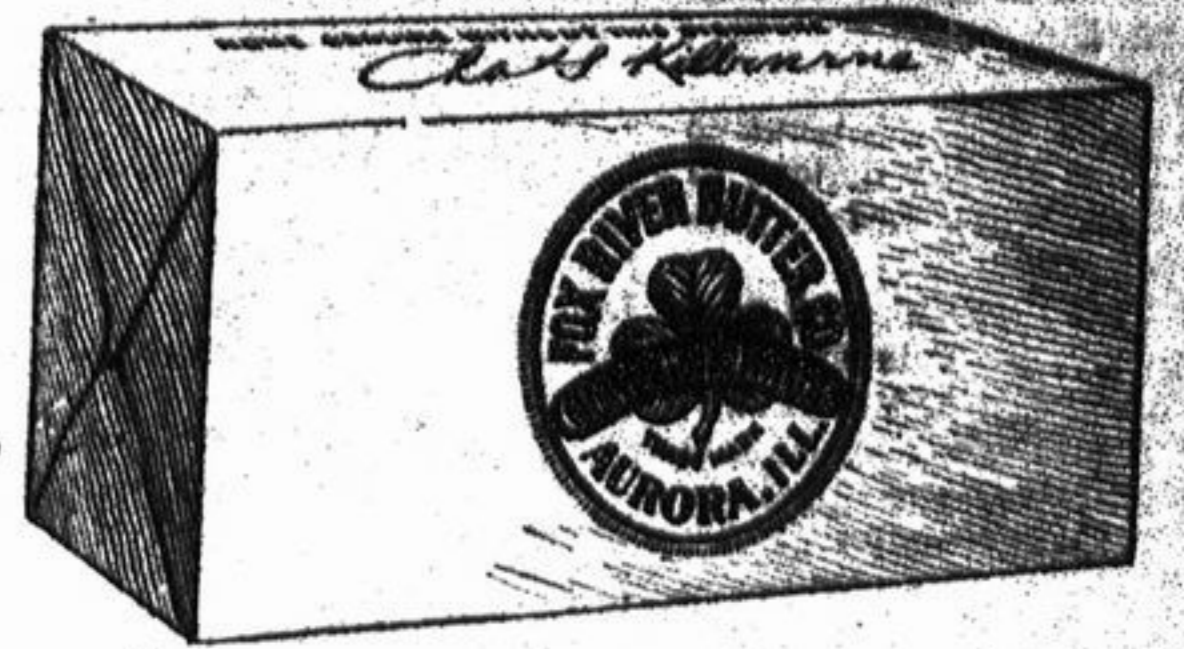

The lack of pasture for the cattle, owing to the extremely hot and dry weather is given as the reason for the advance in price. The dealers say they are obliged to buy feed for their cows at a time when they can usually turn them out upon good grass. Even at six cents a quart they declare they will not be making so much profit as at five cents in the spring when the pastures are fresh. The price of milk goes to six cents usually about the first of October, so the rains is now two months ahead of time.
