### TRAINS MAY BE ABANDONED.

According to a Chicago paper all sub-  
urban trains on the Chicago, Burling-  
ton and Quincy railway system between  
Berwyn and the Union station may be  
abandoned on account of the competi-  
tion of trolley lines and elevated roads.  
If this is done an express train service  
will be substituted to make the run be-  
tween the two points without a stop.

Keen competition, whose effects are  
being felt disastrously on the Burling-  
ton, is cutting into the receipts of roads  
similarly situated throughout the  
country. The plan of this road to drop  
its short-haul suburban service is there-  
fore taken to indicate only the begin-  
ning of the complete triumph of the  
street car in the suburban traffic of all  
big cities within a short time.

The Burlington has not attempted to  
meet the surface traction competition  
in rates, but has relied on its superior  
service to hold its business. During  
the summer month, from May until  
December, the Burlington trains be-  
tween these points, except a few morn-  
ing and evening, have been running  
practically empty.

The suburban service of the road  
west of Riverside is heavy and profit-  
able to the railroad company for the  
reason that the slower time of the  
trolley for the longer distance makes  
competition of the latter practically  
out of the question.

Residents of Berwyn are planning a  
petition to the Burlington suggesting  
that all local trains between that place,  
which is the first station east of River-  
side, and the Chicago terminal, be  
abandoned and an express service with  
fewer trains be substituted. The 35  
regular daily trains now running makes  
all stops at intermediate stations.

Residents of the suburbs beyond Ber-  
wyn, from which higher rates are ex-  
acted, are demanding better and par-  
ticularly faster service and to cater to  
them the new move is planned.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING THE ELECTRIC LIGHT SYSTEM OF THE VILLAGE OF DOWNERS GROVE, ILLINOIS."**

Be it ordained by the president and board of trustees of the village of Downers Grove, Illinois.

**SECTION 1.** That rule four of section three of an ordinance entitled "an ordinance concerning the electric light system of the village of Downers Grove, Illinois" be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

**SECTION 3.—RULE 4.** All consumers of electric light who desire to pay for light consumed at meter rates theretofore adopted, shall be provided with a meter to be approved by the superintendent of electric light. It shall be optional with the consumer of electric light to provide such a meter at own expense, or rent one of the village at a rental of twenty-five cents per month. If any consumer of electric light desires to purchase a meter of the village of Downers Grove it shall be furnished to him at actual cost. A consumer of electric light may also obtain a meter from said village by depositing the net cost thereof with the village collector. In case such consumer shall make such deposit, the village collector shall furnish such meter. Any person making such deposit shall have the right to return the meter to the superintendent of electric light, any time within five years from the date of making such deposit, and upon return to the superintendent of any such meter aforesaid within the time above limited, in a good condition, ordinary wear and use excepted, and, provided such consumer shall not be in arrears for any electric light bills due said village, then the sum of money deposited for the meter, shall be refunded to such depositor, or his assigns, less a monthly rental of fifteen cents per month, for each and every month such meter shall have been in use.

Should said depositor fail to return said meter within the time limited, and under the conditions named herein, then such deposit shall become forfeited to said village, and the ownership of such meter shall become vested in said depositor or his assigns. All electric light meters, whether owned by the consumer, or furnished by the village of Downers Grove as aforesaid, shall be under the control and supervision of the said village, and the superintendent of electric light or his agent, shall have free access at all times into the premises lighted, for the purpose of repairing such meter, or the electrical apparatus. All deposits of money received for said meters, by the said collector shall be paid over to the village treasurer and placed to the credit of a fund to be known as the meter deposit fund.

**SECTION 2.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 3.** This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and legal publication. Passed August 5th, 1901. Approved August 5th, 1901.
