MAY CHANGE TO ELECTRICITY. Burlington Said to be Considering Third

Rail System for Suburban Trains.

"Within a short time the operation of the entire suburban train system of the Burlington road, between the Union station and Downers Grove, twenchanged from steam to electricity, says

ty two miles, it is expected, will be the Chronicle. Tests are now being made with a safety third rail, which, if successful, will cause steam locomotives to give way to motor cars built after the plans of those in use on the elevated roads.

"During the last ten days officers of this company have been experimenting with a new form of third rail. The tests have been carried on with much secrecy on a piece of track about 200 feet in length, covered with a specially built shed, the doors of which have been carefully locked. The shed is in number of shells loaded with five drams, Clyde at the west end of the company's big freight yards.

"It is said that the tests have been entirely satisfactory to the executive officers of the road and that they have practically decided to change the motive power of the entire suburban system in favor of the third rail.

"Entire safety is claimed for the invention. It is said that the rail when fully charged may be walked on with bare feet winhout the least danger. This safety feature of the rail makes possible its use by surface roads. With the Burlington this would be necessary. as the line from the cityle limits to Downers Grove is at grade. When in use by the Burlington company, however, the rail will be protected by cover with a slot for the brush connection with the cars.

"The plans of the Burlington management, it is said, provide for equiping all of the suburban cars with motors after the fashion of the cars on the elevated roads.
