NINETIETH YEAR CELEBRATED

MAN FOR WHOM WHEATON WAS NAMED HONORED ON BIRTH ANNIVERSARY.

Circuit Court in Session at Wheaton—Grand Jury Finishes Labors and Reports—Other County News From Exchanges.

Hon. Warren L. Wheaton, who passed the milestone of four score years and ten, at Wheaton, March 6th, is one of the honored pioneers of DuPage county, in the welfare of which he has been a prominent factor from very early days.

He still resides on the same piece of ground that he took up from the Government in 1830, his claim to the land being made by plowing a furrow around it, as that was before the surveyors had laid out the county. In the early days he was active in assisting the first railroad laid in the county, and helped to found Wheaton College, of which he is still a trustee.

He represented the people of this section in the Legislature of Illinois, in 1848. His present home farm originally embraced 640 acres. No fence protected it from neighbor's cattle but the crops were unimpaired save where a deer now and then wandered through. His generous disposition at the time the Galena & Chicago Union railway was built caused the location of a depot on his land and when Wesleyan Methodists were casting about for a suitable location for their seminary, now Wheaton College, Mr. Wheaton came to the scene and donated forty acres of land, also subscribing \$300 to the institution. The subject of this ninetieth year event has been physically, mentally and in every way an exceptionally strong character, well fitted for pioneer life, and for laying the foundations of schools and city organizations. His memory will live in the minds of Wheaton's history for ever as one who, at whatever sacrifice of personal comfort and wealth, founded her prosperity.

Judge Willis opened the March term of Circuit court Monday. The grand jury has been sworn in with W. B. Carlton, of Hinsdale, as foreman, and Geo. E. Frances, of Addison, as clerk. Fourteen cases were examined by them, they finding 10 true bills. The jury went to the post office on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, there, 17 of whom are sworn in.

The board of supervisors being in session on that day accompanied them to the farm. The jury returned to the court last Wednesday afternoon and were discharged for the term. Judge Willis adjourned court to Monday when he will be here to try law cases. The term promises to be a short one. In their report the grand jury recommended that a second story of cells be procured for the county jail and a more suitable place provided for the female inmates. They also recommended that a stenographer be provided for the grand jury.

Monday forenoon, while returning from the Lombard butter factory, Max Schmiedler, of Glen Ellyn, had a close call. When crossing the railroad track at Barnard's crossing one of the 10 o'clock east bound trains struck one of his horses breaking its jaw and knocking out its teeth. The end of the wagon tongue was clipped off even and the neckyoke broken. The horse had to be killed.

The postoffice at Warrenville has been discontinued and a rural mail route will keep them in touch with the outside world.

AN ORDINANCE amending Section 5, Chapter XI of an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance, revising, amending and consolidating the General Ordinances of the village of Downers Grove, county of DuPage, and state of Illinois."

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the village of Downers Grove, DuPage county, Illinois, that Section 5 of Chapter XI of an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance revising, amending and consolidating the General Ordinances of the village of Downers Grove, be and hereby is amended as to read as follows:

SECTION 5. That the fees for licenses required by Sections 1, 2 and 3, of this Chapter shall be as follows to-wit:

That each foot or pack peddler, selling from a wagon, trunk or other receptacle, shall pay a license, for one day, one dollar for one year, ten dollars.

For each dry-goods, boot and shoe peddler, selling from a wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license, for one day, two dollars; for one year, twenty dollars.

That each sewing machine, lightning rod, tin, stove or hardware peddler shall pay a license, for one day, two dollars; for one year, twenty dollars.

That each person peddling meat or fish, from a wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license, for one day, one dollar; for one year, ten dollars.

That each person peddling groceries, clothing or any other article from a wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license, for one day, one dollar; for one year, ten dollars.

That each person peddling meat or fish, from a wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license, for one day, one dollar; for one year, ten dollars.

That each person peddling groceries, clothing or any other article from a wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license, for one day, one dollar; for one year, ten dollars.

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bakery products, from wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license, for one day, one dollar; for one year, ten dollars.

That each person peddling any other article not enumerated, from wagon or sleigh, shall pay a license, for one day, two dollars; for one year, twenty dollars.

That any person hawking or peddling any other article not enumerated above, shall pay a license, for one day, two dollars; for one year, twenty dollars.

That each and all persons exhibiting any circus or menagerie, shall pay a license of twenty dollars for each day; or part thereof, that the same is exhibited.

That each person giving or exhibiting any theatrical show or amusement, other than a menagerie or circus, where a fee for admission thereto is charged, shall pay a license of two dollars and fifty cents for each and every exhibition; provided, however, that all shows, theatricals and exhibitions given solely for public benefit or charitable objects, shall not be required to pay a license.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.

All ordinance or part of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE Licensing and Regulating the use of Billiard and Pool Tables, Pin and Ball Alleys, and Shooting Galleries within the limits of the village of Downers Grove, county of DuPage, and state of Illinois.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the village of Downers Grove, county of DuPage, and state of Illinois, that no person shall keep for profit, within the limits of the village of Downers Grove, Illinois, any billiard or pool table, pin alley, ball alley or shooting gallery, without first obtaining a license therefor as hereinafter provided, under a penalty of not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offense.

SECTION 2. The President of the village on recommendation of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to issue annual licenses to persons, to keep and run for profit, billiard and pool tables, pin alley or alleys, ball alley or alleys, and shooting galleries, as hereinbefore mentioned, upon the payment therefore, to the village Collector at the rate of ten dollars for each billiard or pool table, pin alley, ball alley, or shooting gallery aforesaid, and such license shall expire on the first day of May next after issuance; Provided, nothing herein contained shall be construed as requiring a license from persons keeping or running billiard or pool tables without charge for the use of the same.

SECTION 3. No person or persons who shall keep or run any billiard or pool table, pin alley, ball alley or shooting gallery for profit, shall permit the same to be used on Sunday, nor permit or allow any person under the age of eighteen years to use any such billiard or pool table, pin or ball alley at any time, nor permit, or allow any such persons under the age of eighteen years to remain or frequent any place where such billiard or pool tables are kept, or such pin or ball alleys are maintained, under a penalty not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars.

SECTION 4. The President of the village shall upon request of Board of Trustees, revoke the license issued under this ordinance, if any of its provisions have been violated, or for any other cause at the discretion of said Board of Trustees.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and legal publication, all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

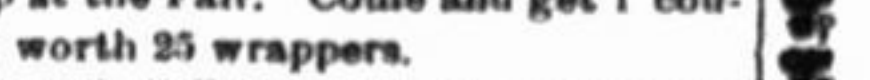
