> Caroline Springer of Hinsdale had been caring for two children belonging to Fred Piera, formerly of LaGrange, whose wife died several years ago, Piera making his home at Oak Park. Last April he went to Hinsdale and deliberately walked into a hardware store and purchased a revolver and loading it he went to the Springer home where an animated discussion was soon in order. Piera deliberately drew the revolver from his pocket and used Mrs. Springer for a target, one bullet going through her arm, another through a lower limb and had she not run up stairs would perhaps have been killed.
