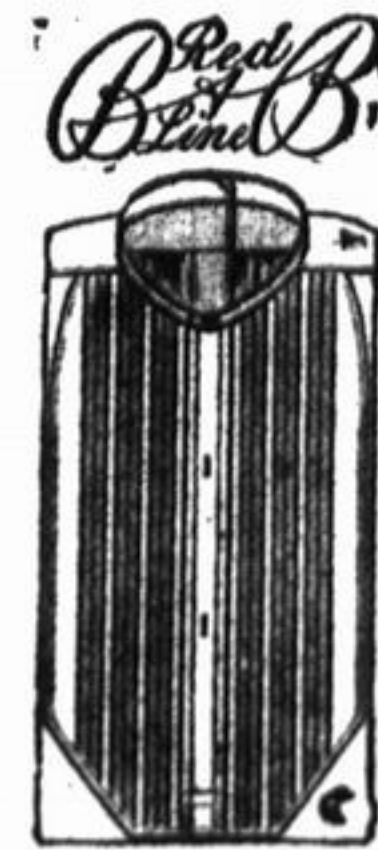
### Additional Local News.

During the next four years the government will try the experiment of printing its own postage stamps. The bureau of engraving and printing underbid all competitors by about \$15,000. Third Assistant Postmaster General Madden is highly pleased and is confident that there will never hereafter be any disposition to revert to private contract work again. Under this new contract it will cost the government about 6 cents a thousand for ordinary stamps and 3, 4 and 5 cents in books. With Secretary Moody building a war vessel and the bureau of engraving and printing furnishing the stamps the country will have an excellent opportunity to test the cheapness and efficiency of public work.
