Old Resident of West Chicago Dies-Attempt to Break Jall Frustrated - Other County News From Exchanges.

In 1840 he came to America and after a couple of years in western New York returned to Germany. He returned here again in 1853 and was married that year to Miss Saloma Stengle and a few years later came to Illinois and settled in West Chicago and engaged in business. Of this union there were four children-Louis, Christian, Jacob and Mrs. Gustave Lang. All of these children, with the exception of Louis, the oldest, survive him and were present at the funeral,

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
