incurring any liability or cause of action for damages of any kind, any permit or regulation to the contrary not withstanding, nor shall such village be liable for loss or damages resulting directly or indirectly from any connection or attachment to the electric ligh wires of said village. If any consumer or consumers of electric light under flat rates shall waste electric ity by keeping the current turned or the entire night without sufficient cause or reason, or shall in any other way unnecessarily waste electricity, the village reserves the right to cut off to find the fungi growing on well-kept the supply of electricity without fur. lawss. Parties return from the wood ther notice.

In all cases when any consumer shall be out off from the supply of electric light for any of the reasons named in this section the same shall not be restored until all the back rents, costs and damages, if any, shall have been paid, together with the sum of two dollars for reconnection.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith hereby repealed. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and legal publication.
